BARONESS STUDYING AMERICAN CHARITIES.

Baroness Marie Salzgeber, of Austria, Directress of the Elizabeth Home in Vienna, arrived last week in New York from which city she will soon begin a tour of the country to study charitable work.

Since her arrival the Baroness has found, she says, that there are no institutions in this country to compare with that over which she presides.

"I was surprised to learn," she said, "that the American girl, with practically no funds, has no place to go where she can learn music and painting. I had heard much about the wonderful American institutions and we Austria could not see why American girls sought us out. They have been coming to us at a rate of twenty a year. The reason is plain now. You cannot afford to provide the competent instructors, the elaborate surroundings, and all the other advantages our home gives at such small cost. For we charge our students practically nothing."

If Baroness Salzgeber is convinced of the necessity for it after her trip through the country, she will recommend to her emperor the building of an extension to the home to accommodate all the American women who desire to take the instruction it offers.
