**Chicago Freight Handlers Strike.**  
Chicago, July 13.—All the freight hand-

ters employed by the Chicago Terminal Transfer company, at its Western avenue depot, struck today because of the discharge Saturday of 21 men who refused to handle freight from the Kellogg Switchboard & Signal company. Pickets turned away every teamster who sought to deliver goods at the depots. The teamsters made no objection and appeared to be in sympathy with the strikers. Business at the
