RICHFIELD. BEET GROWERS IN SESSION

Will Try Another Season in Sevier, to Tes the Sugar Beet Industry.

Messrs. Cutler and Austin State Plain Business Facts - Price of Beets for 1901.

Special Correspondence, Richfield, Sevier Co., Nov. 23 .- The

beet growers of Sevier county assembled in convention Wednescay evening, and all day Thursday. Manager Cutler of the Utah Sugar company was the principal speaker at the first ses-sion. He said that the experimental tests made upon the beets raised in Sanpete and climatic conditions of tnese counties is such as to insure the erection of a factory here provided the farmers will produce a sufficient quan-tity of beets to make the same a paying proposition. He assured us that the factory would be forthcoming as soon as the people make ready for it by producing the beets. It would be neces-sary for the two counties to raise 30.-000 tons per annum to make the factory a success. Sanpete and Sevier counties are asked to furnish 4,000 acres of beets for the Lehi factory next year of beets for the Lehi factory next year at a price 50 cents per ton in advance of what was paid this year. This sea-son \$4.50 per ton was paid at the fac-tory, and it cost \$1 per ton to ship the beets there. Next year \$4.75 will be paid per ton at the factory and the sugar company will, in addition to this, pay 25 cents per ton on the freight, thus giving the farmers an advantage of 50 giving the farmers an advantage of 50 cents per ton over last year. The beet growers feel encouraged and will take up the work with a vim next season.
