

## DAILY HAPPENINGS.

The Golding - Nauvoo Wedding. — Court Rulings. — Railroad Arrivals. — Notes.

The Democrats of Morgan city held a meeting yesterday evening on Tuesday night. The speakers were numerous and included several Ogden geniuses.

Two cars of raw silk for New York from the cargo of the steamer *Central Pacific* were transferred to the Central Pacific to the Union Pacific yesterday.

The damage case of William Driver & Son vs. Thomas J. Stuyver. — The jury after seven or eight hours rendered a verdict of \$100 in favor of the plaintiff. The defendant asked for \$10,000 damages or injuries to his building.

Mr. H. P. Madson, traveling passenger agent of the California Mining Co., Ogden yesterday, said that by the first of next year his road will be within eight miles of Fremont, gold mining, and within three months he will be within five miles of the town. The gold will open up in the same manner as the gold in the United States to which we now have hundreds of miners come.

A leading business man stated yesterday to a reporter that the citizens of Ogden should not hesitate one minute in giving the names and addresses of all Central Pacific to names the shams in their service. The present ten times more than ever the amount to be applied against all classes of citizens will not distract them.

On board last evening's eastbound Central Pacific train, which reached Ogden at 11 o'clock, were many passengers who had been in San Francisco and the City of Beijing to the Orient. The steamer was in the typhoon that wrecked the British steamer *Buckingham*. The ship was lost on the gale, but all the crew met with safety. The steamer was principally due to the excellent seamanship and good judgment of her commander, Captain Robert H. Morris.

In the police court yesterday Christian Sorenson was fined \$1 and costs, amounting to all to \$2.50, for keeping a vicious dog. His defense was that he was William Ayers, dogman, who killed the animal. Soderberg, it is claimed, killed it. William Ayers of cemetery, fame was indicted in the sum of \$5 for carrying concealed weapons. A number of the men who have been bitten by the dog are still well, presumably for the purpose of countering the bite. During the course of his counsel he made a gun play at drummers companion. Mayor Turner relieved him of his position as constable.

One of the most remarkable of compensated marriages was wedded in Ogden yesterday at the residence of Hon. Frost J. Kissel early last evening. The high contracting parties were Mr. C. D. Golding of the Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific and Mrs. Ruth Kuhne, daughter of Clark Kuhne. The ceremony was performed by Rev. S. Unsworth, of the Episcopal church, and the reception was given by Mrs. Kissel. At 12 the newly wedded couple took the Rio Grande Western Railroad to Salt Lake, where they will immediately commence work on the Japanese buildings for the World's Fair that they are specially sent to look after. The seven men have been engaged in the engineering corps of Japan. They had two large chests with them containing engineering instruments and tools particularly adapted for constructing Japanese buildings.

Mary B. Campbell, of Basalt, Box Elder county, commenced suit for divorce against her husband, Holman Campbell, for desertion, want of treatment and failure to provide. The parties have been married twelve years and have had six children born unto them. The complaint alleges that the defendant has, on many occasions abandoned the parties, and that in 1885 attacked her with a butcher knife and would have murdered her, but for the timely interference of her mother. Many times during their married life Campbell has threatened to kill his wife and children, and the language around the house is said to be almost invariably of a profane and scurrilous character.

The hearing of this great damage suit of P. H. Allred vs. Salt Lake City, occupied the entire day in Judge McRae's court yesterday and will consume all of today. The trial will be part of next. The case involves many Andy questions and will require the taking of a vast amount of expert testimony. Alred claims \$50,000 damages alleged to have been caused to his home and garden on the Jordan river, the result of the defendant putting down a large number of trees on a tract of land lying along the river about a mile in a northwesterly direction from the Allred farm. After the trees were cut down he began to plant a large spring lawn, the cost of which was successfully irrigated, diminished one-third its original volume.

## PROVO LETTER.

School Notes.—Building Improvements.—Business and Court Happenings.

Provo, Nov. 17.—Work was commenced Tuesday on the Provo Fire department building. It is to be located on the north side of the court house square. It will be fifty-five feet by thirty-one feet in size; the main portion two stories, and the tower at the northwest corner sixty feet in height. The cost will be \$30,000.

The board of education met Tuesday evening and named the several schools of the city as follows: Northwest school, Timpanogos West school, Franklin East School, Webster Central school, Franklin No. 19 school, Provo High School, and a new school, North school, Mountain.

In the case of Wm. A. Wilson vs. P. H. Hindmarsh, Justice Gath yesterday rendered a verdict in favor of plaintiff for \$40 and costs of suit. Hindmarsh was sued for damages for breaking his cart by running into it with a wagon on the street. The case will be appealed.

A buggy, in which were seated Mrs. Watkins, her mother and several children, was run into yesterday by a mail wagon. Mrs. Watkins was thrown out and severely bruised, but her mother and children were uninjured. The buggy shafts were broken, and the front axle twisted. The driver of the mail wagon drove on without making any inquiries as to the damage he had done. He will be arrested as soon as apprehended.

The Utah Baptist association held their first day meeting in the new Tabernacle in this city yesterday. Rev. Mr. O. Bonney, of Logan Falls, opened by leading in a prayer and praise service. Rev.
