The report of Street Supervisor Seddon for the month of May shows the total expenses of the street and irrigation departments to be \$8,848.59, which, after deducting \$132.30 for work done for other departments, leaves the actual expenses \$8,716.29. The poll tax collections amounted to \$162, and labor performed for poll tax amounted to \$1,995, making a total received for tax \$2,157.

During the month the department put in 106 flumes, 10 stone cross walks and repaired 162 flumes and 35 bridges. The sprinkling department cost the city \$2, 107,45 during the month.
