LOCAL BRIEFS.

"Thou Art the Christ" will be the subject of Dr. Talmage's lecture at the University Sunday school tomorrow.

Miss Redd, daughter of Hon. Wayne Redd of Bluff, Utah, is at the Groves L. D. S. hospital, where she was brought yesterday for treatment.

Twenty-two cars of coal were received in this city yesterday, 20 over the Rio Grande, and two from over the Short Line, 600 tons in all.

John T. Moorman, a carpenter, fell from a roof Thursday afternoon and suffered a severe fracture of the leg. He is now doing well at the Groves L. D. S. hospital.

There will be special services in the Salvation Army headquarters this evening and tomorrow, led by Maj. Mills. The major was located in this city 16 years ago, so that he is no stranger here.

Clerk Judd today distributed warrants for the salaries of the officers of the board of education and of the janitors of the schools for the month of January. The total amount of the payroll is \$2,814.

The first annual banquet of the Y. M. C. A. in this city will be held on the evening of Tuesday, Feb. 6, next, to which members only of the association will be admitted. Plates for 300 people will be set.

The teachers at the Grant school yesterday presented Principal A. S. Horton with a fine Morris chair in honor of his birthday anniversary. After the presentation a luncheon was served in one of the school rooms.

There will be a mass meeting for men in the Y. M. C. A. auditorium at 3:30 p. m. tomorrow, when Rev. E. J. Goshen will speak on "Proving and Knowing." Music will be furnished by the Orpheus club of 25 voices.

Judge Andrew Howat of Salt Lake and H. R. Macmillan of Ogden have formed a law partnership, and Mr. Macmillan will move to this city on Feb. 1 and go into the office now occupied by Judge Howat in the Keith-O'Brien building.

The remains of Harry C. Wilson, who died at the police station the other day, under the name of Hiram McCollum, have been shipped to Canada for interment. Wilson fell and hurt himself on the sidewalk some time ago, and later was picked up very ill on the street by the police.

Immigration inspectors McCabe and Longley arrested a French girl yesterday, named Irene Patisio, who was brought to this country several months ago, by a man posing as her husband. The man is now in the state prison, and the girl will be given a hearing today, with a view to deportation.

City Chemist Harris has just completed the analysis of 15 samples of milk from the city dairies, and has found them fully up to the required standard. There is hardly a market in the country where food conditions are watched so closely by the city and state inspectors as in Salt Lake.

A boy from the country driving a wagon loaded with sewer pipe yesterday, at the Ninth North street crossing, and the wagon and contents were destroyed. The horses and driver, however, escaped injury, and the horses ran down the street badly frightened. The youthful driver finally recovered them.

Mrs. L. E. Carlson's younger piano pupils gave a recital last evening in her studio, and acquitted themselves with credit. After the recital Miss Irene Kelley, one of Mrs. Carlson's advanced pupils, gave a brief program. Miss Kelly will give a recital in March, assisted by Hugh W. Douglas, the baritone, in the Y. M. C. A. auditorium. The evening was made further entertaining by Miss Lillian Hudson with vocal numbers.

The First Baptist church was crowded last night by an audience gathered to hear Dr. Coburn describe the passion play. He explained the features of the historic performance at Oberammergau, and the church was filled with the impression of the audience. Dr. Coburn will be given a reception this evening in the Y. M. C. A. hall, where a spread will be served at 8 o'clock. No meetings were held today.
