COMPLAINTS MADE.

Complaints were received from property owners on Richards street in re-gard to the condition of the crossings at the intersections of that street and South Temple and First South streets. It was stated in the petition that the gutters at the crossings are below the grade and teams are often stalled there and goods thrown out and damaged. It is asked that the grade of the gutter be changed or that culverts be put in. The matter was referred to the city engineer and the stread committee engineer and the streets committee. Some property owners on Third street between K and N streets entered
