Mr. Bryan Forwards His—President Loubet
Sends Them—Philippine Commission
Says it Means Peace.

Lincoln, Neb., Nov. 8.—Wm. J. Bryan sent the following telegram at noon today to President McKinley:

"At the close of another presidential campaign it is my lot to congratulate you upon a second victory.

IDAH.

Bryan Has a Plurality on the Votes Returned of 1,330.

Boise, Idaho, Nov. 8.—About four-fifths of the vote of Idaho have been returned. Bryan has a plurality of 1,330; Green, fusion, for Congress, has 892, and Hunt, fusion, for governor, 1,440. The fusionists have 42 members of the legislature, the Republicans 35, with three unreported. This will retire Geo. L. Shoup from the United States Senate.

DUBOIS RETURN ASSURED.

Blackfoot, Ida., Nov. 8.—Senator Dubois has received definite returns showing a total of 74 members elected by fusionists. Counties to hear from will increase this to 46. This insures the return of Dubois to the United States Senate, as the fusionists will number 53 and the Republicans 12.

COLORADO.

Fusionists Have Legislature by Large Majority.

Denver, Colo., Nov. 8.—The fusionists will have a majority of 74 on joint ballot in the legislature, which will elect a successor to United States Senator Wolcott. It appears from the returns that the senate will consist of 24 fusionists and 1 Republican, while in the house the fusionists will number 53 and the Republicans 12.

DELAWARE.

Unofficial Returns Give McKinley a Plurality of 4,013.

Wilmington, Del., Nov. 8.—Unofficial returns of the election in Delaware show a total vote of 17,400. McKinley, 11,387; Bryan, 2,180; McKinley's plurality, 4,013.

Alexander M. Daly, Democratic nominee for Congress, ran about a thousand ahead of the Bryan electoral ticket.

There is great interest in the official count today as there is a probability of the count changing the complexion of the legislature from Republican to Democratic. The count began at 10 o'clock this morning and will occupy all day and possibly run over into tomorrow.

NEBRASKA.

Bryan Says Democratic National Ticket Carries by 2,000 Majority.

Chicago, Nov. 8.—A telegram was received at Democratic headquarters here today from Wm. J. Bryan stating that the Democratic national ticket carried Nebraska by a majority of 2,000, and the State ticket by 4,000, and that the next legislature of the State will be Democratic.

MONTANA.

The Clark Democrats Have the Legislature by Twelve Majority.

Helena, Mont., Nov. 8.—Complete returns show the next legislature will be composed of 53 Clark Democrats, 23 Republicans, 33 Democrats and one Populist.

Practically complete returns show Bryan's majority to be 5,000, while Toole, for governor, and the rest of the Clark Democratic State ticket, including congressman and associate justice, supreme court are elected by 7,400. Bryan carried the State four years ago by over 22,000.

ARIZONA.

Marcus A. Smith, Democrat, is Elected to Congress.

Phoenix, Ariz., Nov. 8.—Marcus A. Smith, of Tucson, the Democratic candidate for Delegate to Congress, is elected by a majority of 955 over Murphy, the Republican candidate.

KENTUCKY.

State Seems in Doubt, Both Parties Claiming It.

Londonville, Ky., Nov. 8.—At both Democratic and Republican headquarters at 10 o'clock this morning the leaders adhered to their claims of last night, the Democrats declaring that Beckham's sixty-two precincts swing out and most of them in the extreme section of the State—in the First and Eleventh districts, Democrats assert that the Republican, while the Republicans say the Democrats are holding up the First district.

The question just when it becomes a matter of fact is a matter of fact. The Democrats say there is no doubt whatever of the result, but the only way they will be satisfied is with the official count. They say they are in the most difficult position, but to details are at hand in support of the assertion. Democratic leaders on the contrary say there has been perfectly satisfied that they will be satisfied.

Leola Combs, chairman of the Republican State campaign committee, at a meeting of the committee, stated: "Under any fair election law McKinley and Yerkes would have carried the State by 5,000 or 10,000 majority. New York, Nov. 8.—Senator N. B. Scott, at Republican national headquarters in this city, received a dispatch from West Virginia today saying the legislature would be Republican by from 15 to 20 majority.

Trial of Torpedo Boat Stockton.

Washington, Nov. 8.—Engineer-in-Chief Melville received a telegram today from William Trigg, the builder of the torpedo boat Stockton, stating that the vessel made her contract speed in her builders' trial off Norfolk yesterday. The Trigg company has asked for a prompt official trial, and the navy department has expressed compliance.

President in Washington.

Washington, Nov. 8.—President McKinley and his party arrived at 8:10 this morning. Several hundred people had assembled at the Pennsylvania depot to bid the President welcome. Secretary Hitchcock, General Corbin, and other officials gathered about the platform of the President's private car and were the first to welcome and congratulate him. The crowd outside broke into hearty cheers when the President made his appearance with Mrs. McKinley.

After hearty greetings the party was driven to the White House, where the President had breakfast and then returned to the Executive mansion.

The trip beyond Pittsburgh during the night was uneventful, although knots of people gathered at the stations to see the train go by.

Postmaster-General's Report.

Washington, Nov. 8.—Postmaster General Emory Smith, in his forthcoming annual report will again call the attention of Congress to the abuse of the second-class mail matter. He will also call attention to the abuses of the postal service and will recommend legislation looking to the abolition of these abuses. Mr. Smith will review the subject at considerable length, pointing out the vast losses the government sustains through the present practices. Another feature of the report will be the review of the growth of the rural free delivery system in all parts of the United States and strong grounds of its general extension.

Marcus Daly Has Relapsed.

New York, Nov. 8.—Mr. Daly, who was elected to the Montana legislature, has had a relapse of his recent illness and that his life is despaired of.

NATIONAL GUARD ELECTION

New Artillery Company is Entitled to an Additional Lieutenant.

The following order, which is self-explanatory, has been issued from the office of the adjutant general N. G. U. Headquarters National Guard of Utah, Salt Lake City, Nov. 8, 1900.

Battery "A" N. G. NOTES.

It now looks as though it would take the official count to decide between Messrs. Harker and Woolley for the county commissionership of Salt Lake county. Or a revision of the footings from the judges may settle it.

In Draper, Mr. Whitaker, D., received 145 votes for county commissionership, other leading candidates received 123 each.

Herriman precinct has some scattered votes which were not computed in the returns made for publication. As the official report is made, its opening may throw new light on the county commissionership situation.

At least two of the proposed amendments to the Constitution seem to be defeated. There is a strong doubt as to that providing for authorizing county commissioners to abate the taxes of indigent persons.

The announcement that the Democratic candidate for the Legislature was elected in Beaver county must be revised. The Republican candidate, Mr. Barrett, came in 51 votes ahead.

Gov. Wells carried Kane county by 224 votes.

All but one precinct in Summit county gave Gov. Wells' majority there 40 votes.

The third judicial circuit appears to be split. — and Stewart.

Utah county gave Mr. Moyle 78 majority for governor.

It is claimed by the Democrats that mistakes were made in districts 41 and 65, in calculating the vote for treasurer, that reduced Mr. Dale's figures by 3.

In the former he was credited with 142, whereas it is actually received with 147. In the latter he was credited with 148, whereas it is claimed he should have been given 151. In the event that this is true his majority over Carls will be 35, and otherwise changed in the official count.

In Boxelder county, McKinley's majority was 33 votes.

Bryan's majority in Cache county is now placed at 217.

Bear Lake county, Idaho, was carried for McKinley, but the Republicans held only one legislator there, Hon. Wm. Bridge, who defeated.

Ada county, Idaho, gave McKinley 189 majority.

Some people have come to a realization of the fact that there was an election on Tuesday.

The justices of the peace elected in Salt Lake on Tuesday were: First precinct, Peter Lochrie, R.; Second, Morris Schenck, D.; Third, C. M. Nielsen, D.; Fourth, Gustave Kroege, D.; Fifth, Dana Smith, R.

The next State Senate probably will have ten Democrats and eight Republicans.

The present complexion of the State Legislature appears to be 27 Democrats to 36 Republicans. More complete returns may make a slight change.

FILLMORE REPUBLICAN.

Millard County Gives Little Consolation to Democrats.

Fillmore City, Utah, Nov. 8.—There appears to have been a land-slide for the Republicans in this city. All officers on the Republican ticket received large majorities except the county attorney and surveyor. The McKinley electors received a majority of forty votes, Wells forty-five, and Sutherland forty. E. W. Kelly, the Republican candidate for the Legislature, received a majority of seventy-eight. The Republicans are very jubilant and will probably carry the entire county ticket; however there is some hopes among Democrats that they will elect the attorney and surveyor.

BRYAN WOULD NOT
TAKE SENATORSHIP.

Authorizes Official Statement to That Effect
—Says That He Made His Fight For
Presidency and Lost.

New York, Nov. 8.—The Evening Journal prints the following telegram from Wm. J. Bryan:

"Lincoln, Neb., Nov. 8.

"To the Editor of the Evening Journal:

"You may say officially that under no

circumstances would I accept the office of United States senator, even were it tendered me. I made my fight for the Presidency and I lost. I am not going to take other men's positions from them.

"WM. J. BRYAN."

**IN THE HANDS
OF THE JURY.**

Upon the opening of the criminal court this morning Mr. Wanless continued his argument on behalf of the defense in the Prowse murder case.

There were quite a number of visitors in the court when the case opened. Mr. Wanless in his address asked the jury not to hold it against the defense that the trial had dragged along as it had done. He said he had tried to expedite matters as much as possible consistent with the interests of his clients' life and liberty. He then proceeded to take up the evidence of the boy Willie Meyers. He said that the boy had not testified that he knew even the voice of the defendant King. Meyers even said that there was no peculiarity in the voice of the accused, that he could identify the man who was brought to the scaffold at the store of his employer.

Mr. Dorsey, a juror, interrupted Mr. Wanless, and said he had understood that the man who was brought to the scaffold at the store of his employer, which he remembered.

The court reporter here was called to look the matter up.

Mr. Wanless at this juncture went into the law of evidence and proceeded to point out the difference between testimony and evidence. He showed that the jury must look to the testimony, and only that which could not be explained so as to be consistent with the innocence of the accused could be accepted as evidence. He argued that any testimony which was not absolutely proven by these standards must not be considered.

The court reporter here read the testimony of the witness King, which proved that the witness could not fully identify the voice of the man King as one belonging to the man who was brought to the scaffold at the store of his employer.

Counsel made an eloquent appeal on the part of Robert L. King, and asked the jury to let him go back into the world as Robert L. Martell without any more stain upon him.

Taking up the case of Lynch he started out by saying that he did not blame the boys who worked in the Sheep Ranch gambling house.

But he did blame the officers of the law, the county attorney and the police officers, the latter of whom swore they knew the kind of business that was carried on in the gambling house, and that the place was a den of thieves.

He went into the shooting. He said the jury must be absolutely sure that the shot came from Lynch's gun. In graphic manner he went into the act of the shooting, showing that Col. Prowse fired the first shot and that the second shot hit the head of Lynch rendering him unconscious, and claimed that the only shot Lynch fired was fired after Col. Prowse was wounded at all.

In a masterly manner he went into the positions assumed by the various parties to the tragedy, and the places on the floor by the three hold-ups. He maintained that the shot that killed Prowse was fired by the shorter of the three men.

His closing counsel said that Mr. Putnam would tell them that you must convict these men because lawlessness and hold-ups were becoming too prevalent in the city. But when Mr. Putnam was doing this he asked them to think as to who was the most to blame that places of the character kept by Prowse were allowed to run, and make hold-ups by robbing the pockets of their money by snatching games driving them to desperation until they became criminals. "There will a jury be found," said he, "and I believe this jury will be the one who will put the blame where it belongs, and tell the people of Salt Lake City and Utah that the one-time purity of their city will be returned to them."

His closing with a eloquent appeal that the jury at least find that Lynch is only guilty of manslaughter.

County Attorney Putnam then began the closing address to the State. He said that the facts proved by the prosecution was that Col. Prowse was shot and that he died, and that the shot was fired, according to his theory, by the shorter, Lynch. He then went into the law on murder, and maintained that the killing of Prowse was murder in the first degree. He then went into the theory of Attorney Wanless and declared that it was foolish and nonsensical and could not for a moment be considered by the jury. He then went into the testimony, following the evidence closely from the time King was supposed to have purchased the satchel from the store on Second South street to the time of the appearance of the holdups at the Sheep Ranch gambling house. He gave in detail the night of the tragedy, claiming that Lynch fired the fatal shot. He then went into the evidence of the messenger boy, who saw the two speeding down the alley and appearing in the Headquarters saloon.

After the noon recess in the criminal court Mr. Putnam continued his address on the part of the State.

He ridiculed the defense by Mr. Wanless by telling the story of the English solicitor who told the barrister for the defense that he had no case and that he was to advise the prosecution in consequence
