WEATHER REPORT.

Record at the local office of the weather bureau for the 24 hours ending at 6 a. m. today:

Barometer reading at 6 a. m., 29.63 inches. Temperature at 6 a. m., 40 degrees; maximum, 62; minimum, 40; mean, 51; which is 12 deg. below the normal.

Deduction of daily mean temperature since the first of the month, 13 deg. Accumulated excess of daily mean temperature since January 1st, 3.32 deg.

Total precipitation since first of month, 1 inch, which is .18 inch below the normal.

Accumulated excess in precipitation since January 1st, 1.48 inch.

The storm is now central over the lower Missouri valley, while an area of moderately high pressure extends from Washington to western Colorado. Rain has fallen along the Washington and Oregon coast, over Colorado, the Missouri and Mississippi valleys. The following heavy rainfall is reported: St. Louis, 2.35; New Orleans, 1.52; and Omaha, 1.20 inches. It is much cooler over Idaho, Nevada, Utah, Montana, Wyoming and the Dakotas. The temperature dropped as low as 34 deg. at Pocatello.



MARKLAND'S OBJECTION. A protesting letter was received from C. B. To the Honorable President and Members of the City Council of Salt Lake City—Gentlemen—I beg to inform your honorable body that I desire to and hereby do enter a complaint against certain members of the police department, and prefer charges against them because of the improper, unlawful and humiliating restraint placed upon me and treatment of me while in custody on June 2, 1901.
