THE DRAGON BOAT RACE AT HONGKONG.

The cut is a vivid representation of the annual dragon boat race which takes place on the festival of Tien Chung Tsit, on the fifth day of the fifth moon The boats are about eighty feet in length and are manned by from sixty to a hundred rowers. Has the senate of the state of Utah sided and abetted in the violation of the law? That is what several of the senators are wondering, and what not a few are vigorously asserting. In passing a resolution requesting an inquiry into the bounty scandal by the state auditor, a demand was included that all county clerks cease issuing bounty warrants or certificates until the senate concluded its investigation.

ate concluded its investigation. Now the law, as interpreted by Sena-by Bamberger and some others, says with all due plainness that county derks shall issue warrants when a man appears who is willing to swear that he has killed within 60 days the skins he has killed within 60 days the skins appears which within 60 days the skins he has killed within 60 days the skins which he has to present for punching, senator Bamberger was pained and supprised that his legal friends in the senate should have so far forgotten themselves as to urge upon this senate "so unlawful an action. I want this subject," concluded Bamberger, "laid aver until tomorrow at 3 o'clock. I want to prepare a speech upon it." "Evidently you don't want to hear my speech," was his witty retort that set the whole chamber laughing a mo-ment later when the vote on the ques-

ment later when the vote on the ques-

ment later when the vote on the ques-tion was called for. On legality a reply from Lawrence urged that under the circumstances if the senate so desired, it could legally bring in all these county clerks and lack them up pending this investigation -but he thought it was better just to suspend the giving of bounties—an ac-tion he thought entirely within the law, sense it heid things up only for a short since it held things up only for a short time.
