WOULD SPOT FROZEN BALLS.

It should much rather see the 15.2 ball improved than dropped; and if it would suggest, the referee should be spotted every time they freeze. This would make the game a little more exciting because players would be much more careful than not to freeze the balls than they are now, when they only save their positions by banking or making mass shots from the untrodden white ball. Moreover, it would add greatly to the spectator's interest, as the player would be spotted again from spot to position. Indeed, that is the greatest interest in any game of billiards, that is where the player makes a little more for him and a little more interesting for the spectator.
