

If Association Were Formed That Subscribed for Expenses and Sold no Tickets it Could Flourish.

Chicago, Oct. 30 .- "I do not object to boxing as a sport," said Mayor Dunne last night, between rushes of the baseball fans who weer shaking 'his hand telling him what might have been if the Cubs, etc. "What I do object to, once and for all, is the graft feature connected with the boxing game. Show me a method by which boxing can be conducted without a lot of people making their percentages off the bouts, and would be more than pleased to look with favor on the glove diversion."

The stand taken by Mayor Dunne on the boxing question has been generally misunderstood. He is not, and never has been, an enemy to the game, but has held a stern antipathy to the local methods of conducting boxing—methods which have always killed the game when it was wide open, and have invariably snarled up the various promoters. Last season he choked off the professionals on account of the number of folks who got the money outside of the boys who did the boxing. Then the amateurs had a whirl and all went smoothly till it was found that the ham-chewers were merely vehicles to carry the money into the pockets of Goodrich, Graft & Co. After that the hammer fell, and fell with a flop.

If any number of reputable sportsmen would form a bona-tide association, collect among themselves such moneys as would be required to buy gloves, etc., and to repay the boys for work performed, selling no tickets, and hence causing no graft, there would be no obejetion, in all probability, from Mayor Dunne. ANNUAL REPORT OF U. S. TREASURER TREAT.

Washington, Oct. 30.—Chas. H. Treat, treasurer of the United States, submitted his annual report to the secretary of the treasury today and in reference to the more noticeable transaction said in part:

The result of ordinary revenues and expenditures for the fiscal year 1906 was a surplus of \$25,660,832 as compared with a deficit of \$23,004,228 for the proceeding years.

ceeding year.

A continuation of those favorable conditions is reflected in the transactions for the first quarter of the current fiscal year in which the revenues were \$5,871,314 in excess of the expenditures.

were \$5,871,314 in excess of the expenditures.

"The available cash balance on June 20, 1906, was \$180,689,354, an increase of \$35,211,862 as compared with that of the preceding 12 months. The monetary stock of the country took on a growth during the year of \$186,866,727, of which \$118,005,777 was in gold, \$5,450,306 in silver and \$65,392,554 in national bank notes, while the treasury notes de-

\$118,005,777 was in gold, \$5,450,398 in silver and \$65,392,554 in national bank notes, while the treasury notes decreased \$2,027,000. The aggregate stock of money at the close of the year was \$3,069,976,591, of which \$2,736,646,628 was in circulation.

"The national bank depositaries have been utilized during the year as a medium through which the excessive accumulation of money in the treasury was restored to the channels of trade. About the first of April an unusual stringency in the money market was relieved by the temporary increase of public deposits with depositary banks to enable them to import gold. Through this aid more than \$49,000,000 in gold was imported. The balance in banks to the credit of the general fund May 5 was \$102,708,123, the highest point reached during the fiscal year.

The speech to be made by Secy. Root at Utica, Nov. 1, will, it is said, represent the administration's views on the pending issues in the campaign. The president and Mr. Root have cosuited freely about the position to be taken by the secretary in that speech. President Rossevelt has steadfastly adhered to his determination not to write any letter or make public any communication bearing on the campaign in New York. 


