## Elder and Saints met in Conference.

The following report is sent by Elder Leslie G. Young from San Francisco, Cal., April 22:

The Elders and Saints of the San Francisco conference held their tenth annual conference at 909 Market street, San Francisco, April 17, 1904. Saints and Elders from San Francisco, Sacramento, Oakland and San Jose came out in goodly numbers. There were present 19 Elders and about 250 Saints, all feeling happy and well.

The morning session was taken up with an opening address by Elder Joseph E. Robinson, who welcomed all. Elders H. W. Clark, George F. Newland, A. M. Davis and Leo R. Taylor then spoke upon the Gospel and its principles. After the meeting, the Saints took all the Elders out to a good substantial meal.

The afternoon meeting convened at 2 o'clock and Elders J. G. Watt, L. F. Browning and J. L. Smith spoke on the principles of the Gospel. Elder Robinson occupied the rest of the time by presenting the names of the authorities of the Church, and also mission officers, and although the papers of San Francisco had said that some of the younger "Mormons" were going to raise a cry against some of the authorities, still every hand was raised when the names of those men of God were presented to be sustained. Sister Emma Ramsey sang a beautiful song during meeting.

The evening session was occupied by Judge Rolapp of Ogden and Elder Robinson. Judge Rolapp portrayed the sufferings of the Saints during the time of the Savior and showed that it is the heritage of the Saints to receive persecutions. Sister Ramsey then sang another beautiful solo, and the balance of the time was taken up by Elder Robinson.

Conference was then adjourned until October. Monday we held Priesthood meeting. The Elders were then assigned to their fields of labor. Monday evening the Improvement Association gave a social at the mission house, and we had a fine large crowd. A program was given and refreshments served. Sister Ramsey again favored us with a solo, which was enjoyed and appreciated.

The Elders always look forward for the days that bring the Deseret News and Improvement Era. Although we are not very far away from home, still news from home is always welcome.

## FOR A NEW MEETINGHOUSE.

## The Saints in Aarhus, Denmark, Purchase a Building.

Elder Don C. Sorenson writes from Aarhus, Denmark, April 8: Elder Adam L. Peterson of Huntsville, Utah, president of our part of the Scandinavian mission, known as the "Aarhus conference." Since his arrival to this field of labor he has been impressed with the necessity of procuring a more commodious and up-to-date house of worship than the one the Latter-day Saints have used the past 30 years, and with this object in view he has labored unceasingly.

On the 8th of April, 1903, a building fund known as the "Aarhus conference fund" was started with 27 crowns and 25 ore. To this was added a few crowns each month by donation, so that by Christmas, 1903, we had gathered 120 crowns.

After looking in vain in various parts of the city for suitable quarters, and consulting contractors and builders, without satisfactory results, it was made a matter of fasting and prayer, and occasionally the Saints would join us in these fasts.

Shortly before Christmas the "Echo Temperance society" made him an offer of their property, known as 12, 14 and 16, together with their large brick building, known as "Echo," located on Beringsgade. After numerous meetings with the directors of the society, the

property was purchased for the sum of 25,000 crowns, the sanction of Presidents Skandhy and Fjeldsted having been obtained.

We were to pay 12,000 crowns down and as we only had 1 per cent of this amount on hand, some of the local brethren agreed to sign notes at the bank for this loan, but the bank refused to loan us the money.

The loan of 12,000 crowns was finally made, outsiders having given security, and on Jan. 15, 1904, the deeds were signed conveying to the Church the property. President Petersen at once began to arrange for the dedication.

A baptismal font was built in the basement together with dressing rooms. The first floor was arranged for offices and living rooms for the Elders; also a hall for small meetings, seating comfortably about 50 persons; also rooms for one family who will keep the house in order.

The large hall upstairs, or the second floor, formerly occupied by the "Echo Temperance society" for their meetings, was tastily decorated and furnished with carpets, shades, etc., which

The following death notice is sent in a letter dated Sequatchie, Tenn. April 19, and signed by T. J. Russell:

A number of Elders have been to Brother and Sister Chris Wagner's of Sequatchie, Marion county, Tenn. They will regret to learn of the death of their son Fred James. He took sick on March 24, with a bad headache. In a day or two his head swelled out of shape. After the doctor had attended him, he was able to be out of his bed for a day or two, but he had a relapse, and although the doctor again treated him, he did not know any one except once in a while. On the 15th of April, at 6:15 a. m. he died. He was born in 1836 in Attamocum, South Dakota, and came to Tennessee in 1889 with his parents. In 1891 they settled in Sequatchie. In 1902 he was baptized a member of the Church. All who have met him know he was a good member. He often spoke of going west where he would be with the Saints.
