U. P. BOND ISSUE IS NOW AFLOAT Interseting Details Given Out by New York Bankers Re-

garding Sales. PUBLIC MAY PARTICIPATE.

Figure Set at 96 for \$50,000,000 Offer_ ing as First Lien and Refunding Mortgage, 100 Year, 4 Per Cent.

The Union Pacific bond issue is afloat and the price to the public is 96. This much is known generally, but details of the placing of the \$50,-000,000 worth of bonds, which are not so generally known, are of considerable interest. Both E. H. Harriman and Kuhn, Loeb & Company, have made formal announcement of the negotiations for the sale of the bonds, which are first lien and refunding mortgage, 100-year, 4 per cent gold bonds. The taker was the International company, headed by New York bankers and comprising Barring Bros. & Company, and Glyn, Mills, Currie & Company, of London, A meeting of the U. P.'s executive committee was held to ratify the sale and at this gathering the amount of the issue was raised from \$40,000,000 to \$50,000,000. This is a part of the

\$100,000,000 issue authorized by the U. P. stockholders last month. Kuhn, Loeb & Company say \$25,-000,000 worth of bonds will be offer-

ed in the United States and another \$25,000,000, in the form of sterling bonds will be offered for public subbonds will be offered for public sub-scription in England. Kuhn, Loeb & Company refused to admit the Inter-national syndicate paid 93, and is planning to offer at 95½. It is said Harriman held out for 94 early in the transaction, and was finally offered either 93 or 93½. This compromise was accepted, say well posted but un-official sources. From New York and London come denials of the reports that the Rothschilds refused to partic-ipate in the flotation of the bonds bethat the Rothschilds refused to partic-ipate in the flotation of the bonds be-cause of antipathy towards Harriman, in fact, London says the Rothschilds look upon the transaction favorably. It is understood the whole cause for reports of differences between Harri-man and the Rothschilds was the former's refusal to grant any conces-sion in price of bonds to gain any pres-tige the Rothschild participation might tige the Rothschild participation might lend to the transaction. "The bonds are very cheap considering the worth and credit of the Union Pacific," said Mr. Harriman, and that was an end of all discussion. Those who want to buy at market price can do so; those who feel they ought to get a cut are doomed to disappointment. Prices in New York have ranged from 96% to 97%, the bonds selling strong at the highest figure and brisk at lower marks.
