ASTRONOMICAL.

Instructions to the Observers of the Transit of Mercury.

WASHINGTON, May 8.—General Instructions from the government respecting the transit of Mercury. Saturday, have been issued from the Naval Observatory, as follows: Attention of astronomical observers is invited to the transit of Mercury on Saturday, May 9, at 10:20 A.M. It will start on May 8th, 1891, and be partly visible throughout the United States. Its accurate observations of great importance. Every effort will be made to insure success, it carefully observed by all who possess the necessary equipment. The naval observatory will be glad to receive observations of the transit from as many stations as possible.
