## DE LAMAR LOSES SUIT.

Judge Beatty Decides Against Him Regarding Zine Dust Patents.

The sult of Capt. J. R. De Lamar against the De Lamar Mining company of Idaho for infringement of his patent covering the use of zinc dust in the ex-traction of gold by the cyanide process, has been decided by Judge Beatty in favor of the defendant. In his opinion the Boise Statesman quotes Judge Be-nits as assing in part that the atty as saying in part, that the law intends to protect by patent only those who actually invent--those who dis-cover and give to the world something that was unknown, and not to confer upon a claimant that which he merely adopts from the suggestion of others The De Lamar company, it is said, introduced a number of domestic and foreign patents and publications which clearly showed that long prior to com-plainant's patent, the process claimed by it, was substantially described. It has been argued that the zinc dust named in some of these exhibits, was not the article referred to in complainant's patent, but the suggestion is not well supported. Not only was it a well

They sent circular letters to physiclans, health officers, hospital su-perintendents, and others in six hun-dred localities, covering the entire country, asking for reports and infor-mation regarding leprosy patients. Eight thousand circulars have been sent out, and only two thousand replies have been received. From these 277 lep sent out, and only two thousand repues have been received. From these 277 lep ers have been located and their names and addresses obtained. About one hundred are known to live in New Or-
