Cannon, President R. Clawson, members of the High Council, and a goodly number of Bishops and leading Elders of the Stake. The greater portion of the

the Bishops and officers of the was occupied by President Woodto meet the Saints of this Stake, he gave a graphic account of the entrance of the Pioneers into the valley of Silt Lake, related interesting portions of his early history and desire to know the truth, and of his long service of fifty-seven years in the Church. The provisions and blessings offered by the Gosnel to the living and the dead, the manner the Saints have been treated by the. world in all dispensations, and the wicked condition of the present generation were referred to.

Apostle Snow gave personal reminiscences of the days of Kirtland

and biographical sketches of some of the first Twelve.

President R. Clawson announced that the Tabernacle would be dedicated in the afternoon.

The choir commenced the afternoon services by singing the dedicatory bymn.

President Woodruff offered the dedicatory prayer, after which the Sacrament was administered by the bishopric of the Third Ward.

Apostle F. D. Richards esteemed it a pleasant and precious opportu-nity to meet with the Saints on that occasion. He had been interested in the recital of incidents which occurred in the early history of the Church. The recent labors of the enemy to destroy this work had led to the spread of its principles throughout this broad land, in the dissemination of the published reports of three departments of the government of their investigations into the principles of our religion, our family and our social conditions.

President Woodruft remarked on the impending judgments of God, and said the warning voice had been beard by the nations generally.

President Clawson occupied the first part of the morning meeting of the 27th, and reported the healthy condition spiritually of the Stake. He complimented the Saints on their ready response to the calls for the erection of houses for divine worship and other laudable objects, and exhorted them to improve the present moment.

Apostle A. H. Cannon delivered an impressive discourse on the important and vital questions of the day—the conflict of capital and labor, the race question, the spread of the principles of auarchism. These questions puzzled the wisest men of the world, the most profound thinkers, the greatest of our statesmeut, filling them with the most serious thoughts and awful apprehensions of a dreadful crisis near at hand.

Apostle F. D. Richards occupied the balance of the meeting in pre-senting the law of tithing.

At the afternoon meeting the general Church authorities were presented by the Stake clerk. They were all unanimously sustained.

President Woodruff filled all the time for speaking at the meeting. His remarks embraced the law of tithing, the last instructious of the Prophet Joseph to the Twelve, the mission he assigned them, the keys of this dispensation and the power
