Taft has written an articly of the "Republican Party" for the Yale Cour-ant which was issued today. He dis-cusses the organization and develop-ment of the party and of its policies from 1856 until the present time. In the course of his discussion of the railroad rate law, Secy. Taft says: "It has put every railroad man in the country on his good behaviour and created a complete change of attitude on the part of him and his subordin-ates in respect to the statutes of his country. Other corporate abuses have been made manifest besides discrimin-ating in rates. They consist in using the corporate form of investment to float bonds and stocks, the par value of which is far in excess of the real money value invested in the properties, in ad-dition to deceiving and defrauding the public. This involves consequences with reference to reckless corporations that are most demoralizing." FORAKER'S AID NEEDED. Washington, June 33.—That Senator Foraker will go on the stump in Ohio and make the effort of his life to carry that state for the Republican ticket, is confidently believed by Republicans high in the councils of their party. There have been recent conferences among influential Republicans on na-tional affairs and they have tended strongly to bring about this result. On the other hand, it is hoped by his friends that Senator Foraker is to have the support of Mr. Taft and other leaders in Ohio politics for the senator-ship.
