# WINGFIELD GETS BUSY.

Leasers and Employes Restrained from Stealing Ore from Mohawk Mine, San Francisco, Dec. 22 -- On the application of George Wingfield, one of the principal stockholders in the Goldfield Mohawk mine, Judge Morrow of the United States circuit court for the district of California and Nevada, has is-sued a writ of injunction restraining the lessees on the Mohawk mine and their employes from stealing or permitting the stealing of high grade ore by the miners

The court authorized the appointment of 50 watchers, who will be officers of the court, and are empowered to go down into the mines at any time to watch the miners while at work, and to search them for stolen ore. Should any ore be found on anyone, he will be arrested, brought to San Francisco before Judge Morrow and tried for contempt of court.

tempt of court. The court filed the bond for the re-straining order at \$400,000, which will be furnished by the owners of the Mo-hawk mine. Replevin suits were brought by the officers of the mine sev-eral days ago against Wells Fargo & Commany's express and the Salby Company's express and the Selby Smelting Works company, who, it was claimed, had some of the stolen ore in their possession. One hunded and eigh-ty sacks of ore, which it is alleged had been shipped from high grade assay shops, have been recovered, according to statements made by Wingfield.

#### How H. L. J. Warren Views Conditions In Town and Camp.

H. L. J. Warren, formerly of this city, has arrived in New York after a visit to Ely, Nev. Mr. Warren says that the new town of Ely will be constructed on a different basis than most other mining camps in the country. For instance, before a building has been started, a sewerage and water system for a town of 15.996 inhabitants is being constructed. By July next it is expected that all the mines in the central portion of the district will be reached by rail.
