Washington, 3.—The Postmaster General has decided that special de-liveries of letters shall not be made on The Postoffice department has ruled that where third and fourth class mat-ter is malled and directed to a distant locality not a postoffice, not inadvertently mailed, and carried away from the office of mailing, such matter may be returned and a return postage charged when a return request is found upon the wrapper. The claim has been set up by persons interested, that such matter should not have been sent out from the postoffice where it was matted, but should have been returned to the sender for better directions. The Department holds, however, that the sender should suffer for his own neglect in not properly addressing the

The Postoffice department is in re-ceipt of a number of inquiries relative to the operation of the executive order maed by President Grant in 1872 for-bidding Federal officers to hold State or municipal offices. Representations are made that many newly appointed postmasters are members of the board of supervisors and aldermen, or hold other small municipal offices that don't make any heavy demands upon their ime and pay little or so salary. In such cases, where the municipal office does not interfere with the duties of the postmasters, it is urged that the executive order might be relaxed. Complaints are being received at the Postofice Department from the indian Territory of the working of the recent decision of Attorney-General Garland, to the effect that Indians are City Marshal to arrest the man. 
