The undersigned committee hereby tender to the old folks of Salt Lake City, aged 70 years and upwards, a free ride to Ogden City and back.

This invitation is extended to persons of both sexes of the above age, and of all sects and parties, without regard to faith, race or color.

The citizens of Ogden have kindly tendered a warm and generous welcome to the excursionists. Mayor Farr has offered the free use of his splendid Grove for their accommodation, and vehicles will be on hand at the Depot to convey them to it, the Ogden brass band taking the lead. It is expected that the aged of Weber County will meet at the Grove, and fraternize with those from Salt Lake City. On the way north ample time will be given at Bountiful, Centerville, Farmington and Kayville, for the aged residents of each town to meet with and enjoy a friendly shake of the hand with their old friends from Salt Lake City.

Every effort will be used to render the excursion one of pleasure and enjoyment, not only while traveling but also at the Grove.

Those holding tickets for the excursion will be entitled to a free ride on the street cars going and coming.

The Bishops will please see that the aged poor in their respective Wards are provided with picnic, and other comforts their condition may require, also with vehicles to convey them to and from the depot, where the street cars are not available.

The crippled and blind are entitled to a companion to assist them on the trip.

This is purely an aged or "old folks" excursion, gotten up for the express purpose of giving them a few hours relaxation from their monotonous life, and not with the object of making money. The committee therefore rely upon the generosity of those who appreciate the enterprise to help them out in the matter.

Those disposed to do so will please hand their contributions to the Bishop of each Ward, or to the ministers of either of the denominations to which they belong, and if they are neutral or religious matters, to George Goddard at the Tithe Office, or to C. R. Savage, at the Art Bazaar.

Due notice will be given of the day of the excursion, which will be as early in June as the settled condition of the weather will permit.


