a good test this coming season and will report the success I may have. The Late Rose is a potato very much like the Early Rose, but quite as rich in flavor as the latter.

The yield of the Late Rose, compared with the Neshannoc, is as follows.—We ploughed four rows, two of Neshannoc and two of Late Rose, and Late Rose yielded thirty up heaping peck buckets, the Neshannoc only eleven.

From two to four hundred bushels of Neshannoc can be raised to the acre, but the Late Rose yields exceedingly more.

We got the Late Rose from Long Island in the spring of 1872, what it originated from we have yet to learn.

Ordinary cultivation is a term that every agriculturist defines according to his own notion. I have been informed that some plow from three to six inches and the ordinary plowing, while others plow from eight to twelve inches and define it ordinary.
