In the case of Hockaday vs. Edwards, the Papers were returned endorsed, "No service," whereupen Mr. Appleby, counsel for com-Mainant, withdrew the case.

Court then adjourned tili Friday, the 13th, at 10 a m.

Mrs. McGhie, Mrs. Samuels, Mrs. Moses, and Edwin D. Woolley were sworn, and testified on the part of the prosecution, and Dr. Clinton on the part of the defence.

During the examination of Dr. Clinton, Judge Kinney received a telegraphic dispatch announcing the sudden death of his son. As so n as the Judge could recover himself from the shock produced by the mournful news, sufficiently to speak, he instructed the counsel to suspend the examination of the witness, and ordered the Marshal to adjourn Court till Tuesday at 10 o'clock a m.

# MILITARY NOTICE.

HEAD QUARTERS DIST. OF UTAH, CAMP DOUGLAS, U. T., March 17th, 1863.

FIME following rection of an act of Congress is pub-I lished for the information of all whom it may concernt

"Sec 9. And be it further enacted, That every person, n t subject to the rules and articles of war, who shall procure or entice, or attempt to procure or entice, a soldier in the service of the United States to desert: or who shall harbor, conceal, or give employment to a deserter, or carry him away, or aid in carrying him away, knowing him to be such; or who shall purchase from any soldier his arms, equipments, ammunition, uniform, clothing, or any part thereof; and any Captain or commanding officer of any ship or vessel, or any superintendent or conductor of any railroad, or any other public conveyance, carrying away any such soldier, as one of his crew or otherwise, knowing him to have deserted, or shall refuse to deliver him up to the orders of his commanding officer, shall, upon legal conviction, be fined, at the discretion of any Court having cognizance of the same, in any sum not exceeding \$500, and he shall be imprisoned not exceeding two years nor less than six
