FORTY-SIXTH CONGRESS.

EXTRA SESSION.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, 28.—In his speech

on the bill giving seats on the floor

of the Senate and House to the

heads of departments Pendleton

said that this measure applied to

no partisan interest. He touched

the relation of two great powers in

the Senate, and sought to improve

the methods of communication with

each other.

Morrill contended against mingling

the executive and legislative

functions and urged that it was

unwise to do so.

On motion of Pendleton, the

bill was, for the present, laid on the

table.

Clay scouted the idea that the

departments were a part of the

constitutional executive. They were

creatures of Congressional enact-

ment.

Williams introduced a bill to

regulate the legal value of metal

and provide for a free and

unlimited coinage of gold and sil-

ver bullion, and restore coin to cir-

culation. It proposes to

make all gold and silver coins, in-

cluding trade dollars, equal in legal

tender for all debts, public and pri-

rate, to any amount, and at their

nominal value.

Pendleton introduced a bill to

authorize the President to

establish normal training schools

for the benefit of Indian tribes who

have educational claims on the

United States. Referred.

On the motion of the bill for

publication of the Revised

Statutes, after which came the ex-

ecutive session and then adjourn-

ment.
