WOMAN ELECTRICAL EN-GINEER FOR PHILIPPINES.

Mrs. R. E. Tutt, prohably the onl Arts, R. E. Tutt, probably the only woman electrical engineer in the Unit-od States, reached this city Wednes-day with her daughter. Miss Margaret Tutt, on their way to the Philippine Islands. When seen at the Philippine Islands. When seen at the Rainer-Grand hotel by a Post-Intelligencer re-porter, Mrs. Tutt snid "I became interested in the elec-trical work about electron work."

"I became interested in the elec-trical work about eleven years ago af-ter I had moved from my hone in Billings, Mont., where my father and brother were mining engineers, to southern California. At that time there were very few of the streets of towns on the coast lighted by electricity, and, seeing a chance to make a little money, is unliked to the town of San Pedra for applied to the town of San Pedro fo franchise for an electrical plant an system. This was granted and in-stalled successfully, and resulted in my being asked by the people of Long Beach to do the same thing for them. I took the matter up and finally as-ranged for a successful successful to the same thing for them. ranged for a system to be operated from one central station and to supfrom one central station and to sup-ply the two towns named, and Ter-initial Island. The electricity was transmitted through a submarine ca-ble, the first to be used for trans-mission of electrical power. "At first I had a man in charge of the work, but, finding that I could handle the work myself to better ad-vantage, I let him go and took charge myself. The work that I have on

myself. The work that I have on hand now, and which is partially con-ideted, is the installation of two large power plants near Prescott, Ariz, One, which is known as the Arizona Power company, will have a capacity of 6,000 horse power and the current will be transmitted to the mines in the vicini ty at a voltage of 32,009. The other The Prescott Power company, will furnish 16,000 horse power and the trans-mission line will carry about 22,000 volts. I do not undertake any of the construction of the plants, except those in which I am interested myself.
