

WASHINGTON, June 1.—The President has signed the bill to revive the rank of general of the army and sent the nomination of Philip Sheridan to the Senate for that position.

General Sheridan's nomination has been received by the Senate and that body immediately went into executive session and confirmed the nomination.

At 3 o'clock Senators Hawley and Manderson drove to General Sheridan's residence with the commission which the President had just signed making him general of the army. They were at once admitted and were soon joined by Mrs. Sheridan. As she entered the room Senator Hawley handed her the commission with the remark: "Madam, I hand you this with great pleasure." Mrs. Sheridan was much moved and exclaimed: "I know he will get well." She thanked the gentlemen with much earnestness and retiring, said that she would at once hand

to the General.

At 3:45 p.m., General Sheridan signed the following formal acceptance of his commission as General of the Army:

HEADQUARTERS ARMY U. S.

Washington, June 1, 1888.

To the Hon. Secretary of War:

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of my commission as General of the army, to which the President has to-day appointed me. I hereby accept the same.

(Signed) P. H. SHERIDAN,
General.

The signature was written with a pencil in a large and perfectly legible hand.

Soon after the receipt of the commission, General Sheridan took the oath of office and directed the issuance of the following general order, being his first official act in his capacity as general:

General order No. 37.]

HEADQUARTERS OF THE ARMY,
Adjutant General's Office,
Washington, D.C., June 1, 1888.

1. The following named officials are appointed aides-de-camp on the staff of the General of the Army, with the rank of colonel, to date from this day: Major Michael V. Sheridan, assistant adjutant general; Captain Stanford C. Kellogg, Fifth Cavalry; Captain Stanhope E. Blunt, Ordnance Department. In addition to his duties as aide-de-camp, Col. Blunt will continue to perform the duty of inspector of rifle practice of the army.

By command of General Sheridan,

Col. Sheridan called on President Cleveland this afternoon at the General's request to thank him for his nomination and the commission as general of the army, and to hand him a

signed by the General's own hand. 9.00 p.m. The following bulletin has just been issued: The situation remains about the same. Throughout the day General Sheridan's mind has been lucid. There has been no renewal of yesterday's attack, though there is but slight recovery from its effect. No new unfavorable symptoms have developed. He has slept quietly through the greater part of the day.

It was stated at the house this afternoon that the physicians recently called in to consult and further approve the course of treatment previously pursued in the case, do not advise any change therein.

Dr. Pepper stated to the family this morning, so it is said, that while the case was a grave one, he did not regard it as hopeless. His return to Philadelphia has no significance, it is said, beyond the fact that it was rendered necessary by engagements there.

12:30 a.m.—There has been no appreciable change in General Sheridan's condition since the last bulletin was issued. He has coughed but little, has slept most of the time, and when awake has been clear in his mind and cheerful.

MATHEW ARNOLD HAD THE SAME DISEASE.

A prominent physician, in speaking of Sheridan's case tonight, said that Mathew Arnold, his father and brother, had all died of heart failure, the general trouble being the same as that in General Sheridan's case. Mathew Arnold, he said, had lived for twenty years with the disease by being extremely careful of his diet, and it was in this period he did his life work. His death was finally caused by over-exertion, which brought on heart trouble and killed him.

General Sheridan, he said, might live for years with this trouble, if he recovered from the present attack, but it would be necessary for him to always exercise great care, and subject himself constantly to rigid discipline.

WASHINGTON, June 4.—It was stated at 9:30 that there had been no material change in General Sheridan's condition since 5 o'clock. Colonel Blunt said it had been decided not to issue another bulletin until 2 o'clock, except in the case of fresh complications.

Noon.—General Sheridan's condition is unchanged. It is stated that

DOCTOR PEPPER,

before leaving for Philadelphia, told the family that the General's condition was better than when he saw him last.

PHILADELPHIA, June 4.—Dr. Pepper returned from Washington shortly after 8 this morning. "A bulletin issued

this morning shortly after 5," Dr. Pepper said, "expresses accurately the present condition of affairs, and indicates that General Sheridan is doing as well as can be expected. The increased embarrassment of the pulse and breathing which appeared last evening is probably due in part at least to the recent abrupt climatic change. It did not develop into a spell of heart failure, as on former occasions, which is an encouraging fact."

PARIS, June 4.—General Boulanger will today, in the Chamber of Deputies, move for the revision of the constitution and the dissolution of the Chamber, and will demand urgency upon his motion.

BUCHAREST, June 4.—A report is in circulation that it is the intention to crown the Czar Emperor of Central Asia at Samarcand in order to offset the influence of Queen Victoria's title as Empress of India.

The French government is about to build an absolute unsinkable man-of-war. This will be accomplished by the use of colulose amorphe, a product of cocoanut fibre, so elastic that if pierced the hole will close of itself. Now other governments must discover a chemical compound which, when squirted at that man-of-war, will turn that cocoanut elasticity into glassy brittleness. The world is getting on.

MYERS.—In the Twenty First Ward of this city, May 30, 1888, at 11:30 p.m., of general debility, Elizabeth Myers, in her 71st year.

Deceased was born in Whitehaven, Cumberland, England, July 9, 1817; baptized a member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in 1840; emigrated from Philadelphia to Utah in 1862. She leaves six children—two sons and four daughters.

SYLVESTER.—At Bellevue, Washington County, May 19, 1888, James Sylvester, of heart disease. Deceased was born December 4, 1815, near Sheffield, England. He was a member of the High Priest's quorum. He leaves a wife, six children, and many grand-children.—[COM.]

LOSEE.—In Lehi, May 18, 1888 Mary E., wife of A. Losee, born Nov. 9, 1827, in Pennsylvania. She died in full faith of the Gospel.

HAMER.—At Mill Creek, of quick consumption, on May 16th, in his 72nd year Andrew Hamer, of Ostre Reeser, Norway.

Brother Hamer joined the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in 1853, and left his native land for Utah the following year. He was called on a mission to Norway in 1879, and was released in 1881. In October, 1887, he was convicted of unlawful cohabitation, and was sentenced to five months' imprisonment in the penitentiary and fined \$50 and costs. He served his term of imprisonment patiently, although his health was failing fast, and did not complain, feeling that he suffered for his religion's sake. His life was spent in doing good to his fellow-man and in serving God in all things. He denied himself comforts to bestow charity on the poor, and died a true and sincere Latter-day Saint.

CANFIELD.—At Hamblin, Washington County, Utah, May 14th, 1888, of putrid sore throat, Lyman Toles, beloved son of Lyman and Anna E. Canfield; born February 28th, 1879.

POPE.—In the Second Ward, this city, of heart disease, after an illness of two months, George H. Pope. Brother Pope was a native of the Isle of Wight, and emigrated to Utah in the spring of 1850. He died in his 53rd year, leaving a family of eight sons and daughters in sorrow for his departure.


