They are capable of hauling a train of 20,600 tons on the dead level. It is announced by the Santa Fe that its engines will out-weigh the Southern Pacific type by in per cent, and that newer devices will be used. They will be completed by July 1.




## Meets Fatal Accident.

By attention to these details on the part of all applicants or entrymen the depart-ment will be able to determine to whom any returnable amount of money is to be sent.

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




## DEATH OF JOHN E. WESLEY.

## Man Who Came to Utah Fifty Years Ago Stricken With Paralysis.

He then came to America and journeyed across the plains in the company of John Smith, presiding pai-riarch of the Church. On the way west he met Eliza Hunter, to whom he was married, and she made the journey with him from the Missouri river. The funeral will be held at the family residence at 2 o clock on Thursday af-ternoon.

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
