

## GENERAL SUMMARY.

Silver was first coined at Rome 269, B. C.

A railroad tubular bridge is now being constructed across the Nile. The trains are to run along the top of the tube. The engineers are Englishmen.  
The New York Medical Gazette states that twenty-nine suicides, five murders, and two hundred and ninety-seven cases of insanity are directly traceable to spiritual manifestations.  
A paper has just been started at Columbus, Ga., called the *Corner Stone*, for the avowed purpose of effecting a dissolution of the Union.  
The public debt of Canada is between \$23,000,000 and \$24,000,000. It comprises various loans, the longest of which has twenty-eight years to run.  
A syphon for dairymen is now in use in Scotland, by means of which the milk is drawn away from the cream, instead of skimming the cream from the milk.  
Dr. Alexander Mayer, of Paris, announces that he has been able to obtain heat, for all the purposes for which heat is now used, by means of friction.  
An Academy of Natural Sciences has been formed at San Francisco.  
The first negroes ever seen in Europe were brought over by an admiral of the Portuguese navy, in 1541. He imported them for the purpose of converting them to Christianity.  
Boston has raised and expended for school purposes, during the past eleven years, the sum of \$2,810,000, or \$2 40.  
The population of the Australian Colonies is estimated at 700,000.  
Colonel Colt is rapidly becoming a millionaire, upon the immense sale of his revolvers.  
Two lines of sub-marine telegraph, between France and Algeria are under consideration.  
There are a number of Mormon Missionaries in Canton and Hong Kong, China. A writer in the Hongkong Register advocates their imprisonment and punishment as criminals.  
The religious faith of the Chinese rebels is apparently a mixture of sectarianism, Mormonism, and Confucianism.  
Secretary McClelland is now investigating some of the warrant frauds, to the amount of \$150,000, in which a distinguished head of a Bureau in Washington, a clerk in his office, and a broker in New York City, are concerned.  
Bayard Taylor writes from China, that "should the rebels succeed, the probable effect will be to open all parts of China to the world."  
The famous robber Joazeff has at last been caught and slain, and his head taken in triumph to San Francisco. So says the Alta California; but the Los Angeles Star contradicts the report. Other papers confirm it, and describe how he was surprised and taken.  
In Egypt the price of land is thirty dollars per acre, and can be bought only of the Pasha. There is, besides, an additional and perpetual rent of three dollars per acre.  
Four clergymen of the English Established Church, good standing, and receiving good salaries, have recently committed suicide.  
The Pacific Railroad is now opened for passengers from St. Louis to Franklin county, a distance of 400 miles.  
An ancient pyramid, the work of men's hands, who must have occupied this country anterior to the existing history, has lately been discovered in the vast desert between the river Colorado, and the Sacramento valley. It seems to be a perfect counterpart of the Egyptian pyramid, but of vastly greater size.  
The coincidence is noticed that a destructive earthquake which occurred at Shiraz, in Persia, on the 1st of May last, happened at the same time, that a slight shock was felt in Washington City, D. C.; and hence it is inferred they were identical.

The English armament at Spithead now presents a most formidable appearance, consisting of seventeen ships.
