LOCAL BRIEFS.

Sheep Are Affected—Veterinarian Niel of the Bureau of Animal Industry leaves today for Fremont, Idaho, to graduate a course in sheep being pastured on that island.

Christian Church Pulpit—The Rev. C. H. Nell of Helena, Mont., has accepted a call to the pastorate of the Central Christian church of Salt Lake, to succeed the late Albert Duxon, removed to Burdick.

Dr. Sundvall Goes East—Dr. John Sundvall, acting dean of the medical school at the university, has gone east for the purpose of visiting some of the most important eastern schools, including the University of Chicago.

Poultrymen Meet—The State Poultry association discussed how to make chicken diseases less night at the Commercial club and arranged for a series of articles in the state Agricultural College Bulletin covering the poultry interests of Idaho. The reports showed gratifying conditions.

Prosper in Cedar Valley—Stockholders in the Cedar Valley Land & Improvement company are back from a trip of inspection to that section. They report the farming problem as practically solved there. Wheat selling for 85 cents a bushel. Homesteaders are doing well there.

Work Begins at the Post—W. W. Atkinson of Colorado Springs is in town to supervise starting the construction of two additional double barracks and a storehouse at Fort Douglas. He will put 150 men at work at once. His firm has just completed the building of a brigade post at Cheyenne.

Junior Reception Tonight—The annual junior reception to the members of the high school graduating class will be given this evening in the gymnasium. The program has been decorated the large hall for the occasion, which is expected to be one of the most brilliant social events of the year.

Woodmen Memorial Service—The Modern Woodmen of America will hold their annual memorial service in the Knights of Pythias hall, Sunday at 11 a. m. Judge Armstrong will deliver the address. There will also be a short program, and the order will march to Eagle Gate to take cars for City cemetery. A. D. McGuire will be master of ceremonies.

Children's Day in Church—Children's day will be observed Sunday at the Central Christian church with exercises beginning at 10:30 a. m. All pupils in Mr. Zimmerman's class and children of the primary department are requested to be at the church by 10 o'clock. Rev. C. H. Nell of Helena, Mont., has been called to fill the pulpit and will preach both morning and evening.

Salt Lake Woman Robbed—A special dispatch from this city states that while the attention of Mrs. Thomas Croft of Salt Lake City, a traveler at the Union station, was occupied for a few minutes by her little child, a sneak thief took two of her grips from a seat beside her and made his escape. One of the grips contained a watch and a jewelry valued at \$150. There is no clue to the thief.

Still Seeking Judges—The county commissioners are still looking for qualified judges of election for the capital building project which is to be held June 5. As a result of County Attorney John P. Lyon's opinion that only persons who hold tax receipts in their own names can vote or act as judges, seven judges resigned yesterday. The county commissioners will pay \$3 a day and overtime for counting the ballots of qualified persons.

Ask Student's Retirement—The fifty-seven boys of the Salt Lake high school, who were suspended pending the discovery of the boy who tried to raise a "rough" house a few days ago, who later confessed his wrong doing and was permanently suspended, have prepared a petition asking for the reinstatement of their names. The petition was signed and sent to Prof. George A. Eaton, who, it is believed, will allow the erring one to take his examination for graduation.

The Frank Hewitts in Manila—A recent issue of the Manila Times says: "Mr. and Mrs. Frank J. Hewitt came in on the Zafiro and are returning to Hongkong Saturday on the same steamer. They are stopping at the Metropole. Mr. Hewitt is president of Hewitt Brothers company, tea merchants and importers of Salt Lake City, and former president of the city council. He is visiting the Orient for the second time for the purpose of looking after his extensive tea business in Japan and China."

Eight Smallpox Cases—Eight new cases of smallpox were reported yesterday to the city board of health. Within the last month the epidemic has continued unchecked and there are now about fifty cases in the city. GID. SNYDER SHOWS WHERE CITY STANDS

His Report as Treasurer Fails to Set Out How Much is Owed.

Gid. Snyder, city treasurer, yesterday filed his monthly report with the city recorder, which purports to give the condition of the city's finances. Although his report shows that the city has a total balance of \$132,988.75, he has neglected to state the amount of outstanding warrants against these revenue funds. The outstanding warrants show that there is a total overdraft of \$309,926.09.

The total receipts of the revenue fund for the month were \$25,367.18, and the disbursements, warrants paid, were \$50,944.33. The treasurer reports \$70,583.25 on deposit in the National Bank of the Republic and cash on hand \$1,767.13. These amounts are for both revenue and special funds. Warrants outstanding reduce the amount to a net balance on hand in both funds of \$315.70.

The balances in the revenue funds are given as follows by Mr. Snyder's report: Contingent fund, \$50,417.58; water supply and irrigation, \$88,862.57; waterworks, \$8,988.33; streets and sidewalks, \$13,370.71; sewers and drains (overdrawn), \$35,751.47; bond sinking fund, \$10,652.90; bond interest fund, \$1,569.93; total balance, \$132,988.75.

Mr. Snyder's figures showed the amounts of the outstanding warrants in these funds as follows: Contingent fund, \$64,153.32; water supply and irrigation, \$64,153.32; waterworks, \$58,357.33; streets and sidewalks, \$13,762.65; sewers and drains, \$103,222.80; bond sinking fund, \$10,652.90; bond interest fund, \$1,569.93; total warrants outstanding against revenue funds, \$309,926.09.

The overdrafts in the others when outstanding warrants are considered are: Water supply and irrigation, \$63,268.57; waterworks, \$48,589; streets and sidewalks, \$12,751.47; sewers and drains, \$103,222.80; bond interest fund, \$1,569.93; total overdraft in city's working funds, \$309,926.09.

His Attorney Says He Cannot Proceed Until Furnished With Transcript.

He said that he was not prepared to go ahead until he could have a transcript of the evidence that had been taken. This will not be ready for several days. HAROLD PITT RETURNS FROM IMPORTANT VISIT

As Representative of the Manila Merchants' Association, He Placed Tariff Matter Before Senators.

Harold M. Pitt, a former Salt Lake boy, and a member of the Utah battery, during the Spanish-American war, is in Salt Lake again after a visit of several months in Washington. Mr. Pitt has been in Washington as the special representative of the Merchants' association of Manila, and has been working in the interest of absolute free trade between the United States and the Philippine Islands. Mr. Pitt states that free trade, from the Philippine standpoint is much to be desired. He also states that this country would be a great beneficiary of trade against the Philippines. He points out that the trade of this country with tropical countries such as South America, Mexico, Japan, India, Java and the Straits Settlements amounts to more than \$500,000,000 per year, and that the balance of trade against this country is fully \$250,000,000. The cause of this, Mr. Pitt states, is that while this country is giving this enormous amount of trade against the countries mentioned, those countries are buying from European points as they can get their goods cheaper in Europe than in the United States. To the difference in the wage scales.

The tariff bill now under consideration in the senate, admits all Philippine products to the country free, with the exception of tobacco, sugar and rice, although 150,000,000 cigars, in addition to leaf tobacco, and 300,000 tons of sugar will be admitted free under the new schedule. The Merchants' association of Manila is working for the admission of these products entirely free, and believes they will win in time.

Mr. Pitt says he has visited all the big cities in the country since arriving here from Manila some months ago, and that he has not found one city that is growing as rapidly as Salt Lake. He will leave Salt Lake soon for the Philippines, he will take the steamer Minnesota June 12, for Manila.
