ABDUCTED GIRL FOUND IN DAVIS CO.

Dr. Harding Arrested and Placed
in Jail for Serious Offense—
Collapse of Prisoner.

DEATH OF JOHN CONNORS.

Sudden Summons of Popular Railroad
Man—Death on the Rail—Glove
Contest Monday.

Ogden, Utah, June 17.—Dr. Harding has been placed under arrest for taking little Cora Hartog, the 15-year-old daughter of J. Don Hartog from home a few days ago without the consent or knowledge of her parents. His arrest was made yesterday afternoon by Constable Ben Brown of Davis county who overtook him near Centerville as he was driving a single buggy with Miss Hartog and his son in the buggy with him. He and the girl were taken to Farmington where they were locked up awaiting the arrival of the Ogden police. The boy escaped. Their capture was telephoned Chief of Police Browning who sent Sergeant Wilson and Pinckney to Farmington to bring them back to Ogden. The officers on arrival were going to bring them back on the early evening train, but having taken a fit on learning of the seriousness of his offense, and could not be brought up until a later train. The girl's parents are determined to prosecute Harding for his offense. Charge of kidnapping may be brought against him. The case has raised considerable of a sensation, as the little girl comes of one of the most highly respected families of Ogden, and has always been a very good and obedient child.

DEATH OF JOHN CONNORS.

John Connors, one of the oldest employees of the Southern Pacific railroad company, passed away in death at his home on the corner of Lincoln avenue and Twenty-seventh street at the age of 61 years.

Mr. Connors was an old trackman in the Southern Pacific, for years having been in charge of the Ogden yards. He had been married for 35 years, and had a comfortable position of roadmaster over the old division between Ogden and Salt Lake. While in service he won the admiration and sincere friendship of all employees with whom he had any business relations. This friendship and faithful service to the company had made him one of the most popular railroad men in this section of the state, and his many friends will learn with regret of his sudden demise.
