No Gold Road Amendment to be Offered at Taft Session.

ST. PAUL STREET CAR MEN STRIKE.

Investigating the Nicaragua Canal.—Bare Railroad Wrecks.—Russians Still Fighting in France.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 25.—President Sherman says he has no inclination to offer an amendment to the "Taft bill" for the sum of \$100,000,000 bonds to strengthen the gold reserve at this session. He will, however, if not for that purpose, file his bill in the regular session, as he will be inclined to do so for that purpose. His opinion is that the bill is a good thing for both the Atlantic and Pacific coasts; the cause was constructed, as it would stand now, nearly eleven thousand miles nearer to the Pacific than to the ocean. The Committee on Foreign Relations passed a motion yesterday to postpone investigation until next session.

The expense of sending such a committee to make an investigation may prevent several bills by the House of Representatives.
