LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

SABBATH MEETINGS.—Yesterday the meetings were held in the new Tabernacle. In the morning Elders G. H. Dunford, H. G. Park, G. Rompney, H. Snell and J. Holmberg, missionaries, addressed the congregation, also Elders John Halseil and G. B. Walcott.

In the afternoon Elder J. C. Little occupied a portion of the time and was followed by Elder Joseph E. Smith in a discourse on the practical duties of our religion.

PARING ATTEMPT FATALITY TERMINATED.—Warden Rockwood informs us that while the Penitentiary convicts were at work this morning up Spring Canon, about six miles from the city, two of them, named George Cook and James Watson, the former of which stole some horses from Riverdale two or three weeks since, the latter some harness from Bro. Rockwood and several articles from the stables of B. H. Young, Esq., of this city, broke from the ranks and attempted to disarm the guard. The latter, however, having some distrust of them, were prepared, and Cook was instantly shot dead and Watson very mortally wounded; he died at 3 o'clock this afternoon. The guard, in this instance, are praiseworthy in having so promptly performed their duty.

THEATRICAL.—On Saturday evening the drama of Moll Pitcher drew a tolerably good house. This is one of the most romantic dramas that has been presented here, abounding in startling scenes and situations, and not at all deficient in the comic element. The character of Moll Pitcher is the most successful delineation of character yet attempted here by Mrs. Phelps; Rosalie Elleston was well played by Miss Leckhart, Messrs. Margerets and Graham, as Hook, son, and his hopeful son Hook, Junr., created considerable mirth. The parts entrusted to Messrs. Lindsay, Hardy, Thorne, McIntosh and others were well played.

The piece will be repeated to-night, and should not fail to be seen by all who want an hour or two of the startling and sensational.

IN TOWN.—Dr. T. C. Durant, accompanied by Col. S. Seymour and Messrs J. Duff, L. H. Boomer and T. E. Siskles, paid a flying visit to the City yesterday; they left for the scene of operations on the railroad this morning.

GOT HOME.—Elder H. J. Richards reached this city from New York yesterday. We were pleased to see "the doctor" looking so hearty after his long trip.

FOUNTAIN GREEN.—Bro. R. R. Llewellyn, of Fountain Green, called this morning, being in the city to replenish the stock of goods for the Co-operative Institution of that place. The co-operative system was commenced there on the 12th of January last and on the 12th ult., the dividend yielded was highly satisfactory to the shareholders, although goods had been sold at a cheaper rate in Fountain Green than they ever were before the co-operative system was started.

A good many new settlers have arrived in the settlement, and more land is being surveyed on the south and west for their accommodation. A few grasshoppers have appeared in one portion of the new survey, but nothing to cause uneasiness or alarm. The prospects for crops are good and a larger quantity of the various kinds of grain will be sown than in former years.

MAY WALKING.—We noticed the 15th Ward Sunday School pass this office this morning in charge of their superintendents—Messrs. Hall and Binder—and their teachers, on their way to the springs north of Kinsign Pass, where they expect to spend a happy day, having been banded to discourse sweet music to help to pass the fleeting hours with pleasure.

ROCKLESS FIRMING.—The careless use of the arms is a practice which we fear is growing with some of the young folks in our midst, and requires the prompt attention of parents or we may have to lament the occurrence of some sad accidents arising therefrom. There are certain days in the year, which some of our boys seem to think can only be celebrated by the reckless use of powder and shot. Such a day is the last of May; and we are sorry we have had to listen to several accounts of boys firing last Saturday in and near City Creek Canyon in which two or three children belonging to the 20th Ward day school, who were out May walking in the charge of their parents, came very near being wounded, one little fellow being hit by a spent ball and another having the sleeve of his coat singed by a passing bullet. Whilst we are amongst the last to wish to debar boys of any rational enjoyment, at the same time we must express the opinion that shooting at random is neither sensible nor desirable, and we think parents should exercise sufficient authority over their offspring to prevent them carrying loaded pistols firing them off where there is the least chance of doing mischief.

THE UTAH MAGAZINE.—The first number of the third volume of the Utah Magazine, published by Messrs. Harrison & Godde, of this city, has come to hand. It should be called No. 1, Vol. 3, of the new series of the Utah Magazine, for it is so thoroughly improved in the originality of its matter, appearance, quality of paper and workmanship that it not the least affinity between it and the preceding volumes can be observed. Among its contributors we notice the names of E. W. Tullidge, E. B. Keisley and John Woodward, Esqrs., and others of our local society.

The contents are varied and entertaining, and can hardly help suiting the taste of a large and varied class of readers. "Never Delivered," a complete story, is a very readable paper, as is the "Adventure on Mount Blanc." The musical department is a feature that will be acceptable to many readers. "How the World has Grown" and the "History of the World, Illustrated in its Great Characters," promise to be of considerable interest. But the most striking feature in connection with the new volume of the Magazine is a novel, entitled "The Hebrew Maiden, or Not All Dross," by Elder E. W. Tullidge, the opening chapters of which are very interesting. The fact that the author of this story is an older of long standing in the Church is a guarantee that in point of morality it will be unquestionable; while his acknowledged ability as a writer vouches for its excellence as a literary point of view.

The Magazine is not marred by advertisements, as is the case with the generality of magazines, and now contains sixteen pages of solid reading matter, instead of twelve, as formerly, while its price per year is reduced from \$7 to \$4.50. It is a credit to the community, and will compare favorably with any of the similar character East or West.
