

TELEGRAPHIC. WASHINGTON ITEMS.

Congress to Adjourn on Thursday; the Program.

ACTION OF THE SILVER MEN.

Cleveland May Vote the Admission of the Territories.—Suggestions as to Money Legislation.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17.—It is the present intention of the leaders to adjourn Congress next Thursday for the holiday recess until January 1st. The tariff bill will be reported Wednesday or Thursday, but debate will not begin till after the recess.

Tomorrow the debate over the appropriation of \$200,000 for special pension examinees will be resumed, followed by agreement to an hour and a half on each side. The bill will then pass.

The New Mexican statesmen will then adjourn, and is expected to meet on Monday or Tuesday.

The President's situation seems likely to prevent debate. It is stated on the highest authority that the new legislation will be introduced before he goes home, all in his power to fight the wrong done him by the House majority, and the situation must now be dealt with by Congress.

The program in the Senate includes the admission of the Hawaiian Islands and districts, which may occupy the balance of the week.

THE SILVER CONFERENCE.

An Official Explanation of the Action Taken.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17.—A. J. Warner, president of the conference of the Bimetallic League, today gave out the following explanatory statement of the action taken:

It was agreed first, that the money question, and will continue to be the paramount issue till settled rightly, and be disposed of by other.

Second—The first task is for the miners.

Third—Miners who still believe the silver men can only stay silver must either reach Congress, but must never leave party and work immediately to accomplish the sheet for which they were sent.

Fourth—Delegates stayed the organization of a new party, with the money question as the sole issue, leaving the way open for affiliation, not only to the People's party, but to the miners who refused to go at the late hour. When it was believed the miners finally agreed upon what to do the silver policy in the coming Congressional election.

The conference recommended that silver leagues everywhere be organized and affiliated with the miners, and everywhere, with a view to controlling the election of members of Congress and state legislatures; also, that during the winter two silver conventions be held, one in the month, the other in December, etc.

THE STATEHOOD BILLS.

A Ready Question on Fish, Shell, and Game.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17.—The Senate committee on territories will probably not take up the statehood bills from the House before the holiday recess, at least not for the first act. It is probable that a bill for the adhesion of Oregon to the Union will be referred to the other side. The Bimetallic League demanded this, believing there were better chances for Republican success in California than in the other new states.

It is quite certain that the effort will be made to introduce the Oregon bill, and has given a ready question in connection with the miners' resolution. It is believed the President has been considering the prospect that the admission of four new states would result in such silver miners, and fears are already expressed that he may veto one or more of the bills.

The Special Message.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17.—The House committee on banking and currency has received a large number of replies to an invitation for suggestions from the House on the so-called monetary legislation to meet the present demands.

Ex-Senator Charles H. Farwell of Chicago writes: "The government ought long ago to have got out of the currency business. It should pay the debts of the country in gold, and lower rate bonds to be used by the national banks as their base value as a basis of circulating notes."

The chamber of commerce of San Francisco affixes the unfeeling base to the suggestion: "The public and adopts the following resolution, which are transmitted to the committee: "Resolved, That the chamber recommends the changing of the name of the currency to 'gold' and the note circulation equal to the just value of the government bonds hypothesized to secure such circulation."

JUMPED THE TRAIN.

A train goes down on the tracks.

On Dec. 17.—Section 104, 2d, 3d, 4 miles east of Cheyenne, Colo., was killed by a horse this morning, and four men, ten stock cars and two iron coal cars, with the engine, were precipitated down a steep embankment about West Point station, 12½ miles west of Cheyenne, and were scattered over a distance of about 100 yards, one man probably fatally injured and three others slightly hurt, and about one hundred cattle as many being slaughtered.

The cause of the accident was the

jumping of the track of the train of a stock car in the middle of the road. It jumped along the line 200 yards, until a narrow part of the line was reached, when suddenly the engine and the rear end of the train on the west side, the two cars were upon the white weight of the car, thus being placed on the edge of the road, the road going away and slipped down.

The car and track went together, and the coupling holding the engine was badly damaged after impact. The engine went off in the air and came completely over, wrecking it. The cars in the middle of the train were all broken, and the coal cars were completely destroyed.
