YOUNG SOLDIER'S SAD END

Succumbs to Typhoid Fever at City Jail Among Strangers.

stupidity of Officials Responsible for His Demise in Jail-Gamesters Arrested.

A sad and untimely death occurred yesterday afternoon at 2:20 at the city jail, when the spirit of a young man named Frank Yount departed from this sphere of existence, after about ten days' suffering from typhoid feyer.

The young man was an honorably discharged soldier, having served his country faithfully in the regular army for three years and in the volunteers in the Philippines for two years. His discharge papers gave him an excellent record as a soldler, and he had a number of very good letters of introduction from various parties for whom he had worked since his leaving the army. He had been working for a short time on the big dam which is being built in Weber canyon, hoping that the mountain climate would agree with him, as he had been wounded while in the army service and the wound had not healed up, but instead of the wounds healing and his strength returning to him, he grew weaker, until about ten days ago when he was sent to Ogden where he could get medical aid. Being without funds, he went to the police station and asked for shelter from the cold, He asked for shelter from the cold. The was taken in, and should have been sent to the hospital for care, but owing to the contrariness and stupidity of the city and county officials, who cannot city and county officials, who cannot agree as to who shall care for the transient poor, he was cared for at the jail. Dr. Dickson, the police offi-cers and Mrs. Snyder cared for him as best they could. He was given nice, clean bedding and had special food; but it made him feel terrible to think made him feel terribly to think of being in a jail, and the end came

Knowing the amounts of crops produced and the con-sumption from past experience, an equitable minimum price will be fixed by the directors of the national body and reported afterwards to all parts of the country.
