TEST OF CREMATORY.

This Time It Was Much More Satisfactory Than Before.

The second official test of the new crematory was finished this morning at 8:15 o'clock, and was much more satisfactory to the officials in charge than the previous one. In the 24-hour test 30 tons of garbage was destroyed at a total cost of about \$21, or an average of about 70 cents per ton, instead of \$1.27 per ton as on the previous test. The fuel bill was cut down which made the difference in the expense of the test. In the first test 5,000 pounds of coal and 2,000 pounds of coke were used. In the test yesterday the same amount of coal was used, but the coke was reuced to \$49 pounds. The expense of labor was the same yesterday as on the first test.
