A LADY CURSED TO DEATH.

Deaths in Atlanta—More About the Murderers' Trials in Wyoming, Etc.

Chief Lyman of San Jose, Cal., has stated that he hopes to see the end of the execution. At the aid of a clergyman, more efficient service is expected.
