As there are doubtless many in the country similarly situated, we state, for their benefit, that a rule recently established in the Third District Court, which holds its sessions in this city, requires all applicants for naturalization to give a week's notice to the Court of their intention to do so.

**THEAT ENTERTAINMENT.**—The entertainment given in the school house of the 5th and 6th Wards, last night, was a success. The room was crowded to excess. The 6th Ward quartette band was present and played a number of times. Several original poems were recited, dialogues were rendered, and a variety of songs and songs were sweetly and effectively sung. All who were present seemed highly delighted. As the school-house is not capable of holding all who are desirous of attending, the committee under whose direction the entertainments are conducted have decided to issue tickets in future. The effects of these weekly amusements, among the young are already being manifested; many of the youth, in the lower part of the city, who have been in the habit of loafing around and indulging in mischievous practices on the streets are having their minds diverted in another direction, in preparing, during the evenings, to participate in the performances.

**CO-OPERATION.**—Henry W. Naisbit, Esq., delivered a lecture on Co-operation, in the 19th Ward library institute, last night. The room was crowded on the occasion and the subject was handled by the lecturer in his usual masterly style. He spoke on the origin of, and the causes which led to the adoption of the principle in this community, what it had already accomplished, and the revolutions it was destined to bring about in the future. He was listened to with the closest attention by the large and respectable audience, a considerable portion of which was composed of young people.

**THOSE RAILWAY ROBBERIES.**—The railway robbers, Baker, Norton and Taylor whose sentences were mentioned in the local column yesterday, commuted the crime for which they are now paying the penalty, near Independence, and not between Reno and Verdi, as then stated; the robbery committed between the two last named places was by another gang.

**GONE ON A PARACHUTE TOUR.**—Elders Edward Stevenson and Nathan Parlier left this city to-day, on a preaching tour in the South; they expect to go as far as Idaho.

**A GRATUITOUS SLUR.**—The Helena Daily Herald, of the 13th instant, in a notice of the nomination of Mr. Silas A. Stickland, of Omaha, for Governor of Utah, says it hopes that under the new regime life and property may be, in some degree, protected in Utah, and that the laws of Congress may be carried into effect in that Territory.

This is a most gratuitous slur on the people of this Territory, for the press of Utah might with equal propriety return the compliment regarding the people of Montana. Since the settlement of this Territory there has never been a time when life and property were not under more respect than in any of the Territories around Montana not excepted. There never has been any necessity for a vigilance committee here, the very strongest proof, in a frontier country, that respect was paid to life and property; greater, we think, than Montana can boast. There has never been a time in the history of Utah, when extra care and vigilance has been necessary to secure the above. It has been solely owing to the advent of "new regimes," and to the influx of their hangers-on, and that is true to-day as at any preceding period in the history of our Territory. We think that, in the light of our history, the past history of Montana is proof enough to the last to cast gratuitous slurs or insinuations on any people about protection to life and property, or respect to law.
