Washington, Dec. 5 .-- The California delegation in Congress has received what they consider a satisfactory surance that the president did not site to be understood as saying in Japanese section of his message th

It is said to have been his purpose to convey the idea that he would use the convey the idea that he would use the military to protect the Japanese against mob violence. Californians take no offense at this interpretation of the measure, and agree that the chief ex-ecutive should do everything in his power to protect Japanese, as well as all other foreigners, against violence.
