

## PRESIDENT WAS MISUNDERSTOOD

Does Not Intend to Use Army to Force Japanese Into California Schools.

State's Delegation in Congress Considers It Satisfactory—Views of Gov. Pardee.

Washington, Dec. 5.—The California delegation in Congress has received what they consider a satisfactory assurance that the president did not intend to be understood as saying in his Japanese section of his message that

he would use the military forces of the United States in forcing the Japanese into the California schools in which the white children are taught. It is said to have been his purpose to convey the idea that he would use the military to protect the Japanese against mob violence. Californians take no offense at this interpretation of the measure, and agree that the chief executive should do everything in his power to protect Japanese, as well as all other foreigners, against violence.

"This whole San Francisco affair is proving to be a tempest in a teapot," Representative Julius Kahn said today. "It will die out rapidly, as soon as there is a general understanding of why California takes the position it does."

"The citizens and the public will settle all the legal questions involved in the San Francisco courts. We are glad to know that the administration is taking steps to institute action which will give the courts a chance to pass on the validity of the San Francisco board of education's action."

Representative Jenkins of Wisconsin, chairman of the house committee on judiciary, made a statement today in regard to the Japanese situation, as follows:

"I don't think the president understands the situation out here any more than any of the other people of the east do. I also do not think the right of naturalization should be extended to the Japanese. We can get over the school proposition very easily by applying an age limit. I think the state now provides for this. I favor separate schools for the Japanese, as well as for any other alien and unmixed people."

Chicago, Dec. 5.—An elastic currency issued by national banks at a low rate of interest which will ebb and flow as the demands of commerce require, was advocated by J. B. Forgan, president of the First National bank, in an address before the Bank Clerks' association last night.

The basis for this double issue will be the unissued balance of the national banks bonded reserve. Mr. Forgan said the committee investigating this matter found the 6,000 banks had outstanding but 62½ per cent of the amount they are authorized to issue. They therefore have a standing reserve of 37½ per cent. The committee plans to allow for the issuance of 62 per cent low rate currency and 12 per cent high rate currency.

"As matters now stand," said Mr. Forgan, "the national bank notes in all affairs of the business world are treated as other forms of money, and it is not within the power of the issuing bank to recall them. What is wanted is some form of currency which will

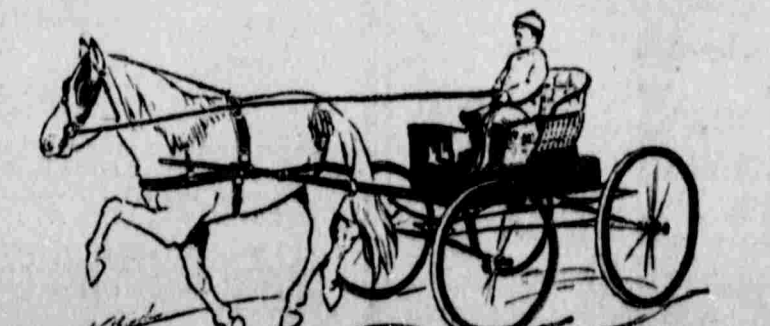
