SENATOR JONES SAYS BRYAN WINS.

Kentucky, California and Other States Claimed for Both Candidates.—How States Will Divide the Count.

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HAS BRYAN WON?

Senior Jones Insists that Bryan is Ahead.

THE REPUBLICANS ARE CONFIDENT.

Looks Like It Will Be the Election of 1876—McKinley Party Will Give Up Hope Yet.

CHICAGO, Nov. 4.—Senator Jones sent the following telegram to W. J. Bryan at 11 a. m.

"Dear Mr. Bryan:

"We all along claimed for you southern states with 104 votes, and states west of the Missouri with 104 votes, leaving you with 208 votes, and we counted on Indiana, Michigan and Minnesota. We have no information except press dispatches indicating that we have lost any of these states. On the contrary, we are positively assured of all the states south of the Missouri, and that we have not lost from the West as far as heard from is California, Illinois, Washington, Wyoming and Minnesota are reported by our friends to be all right. If we carry three of these states, with Minnesota, Michigan and Indiana, we certainly win, and reports are favorable from there. Martin, chairman of Indiana, writes at 2 o'clock this morning that we have Indiana. All reports from Michigan show immense gains and towns of Michigan say the state has been won. 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CHICAGO, Nov. 4.—The return received by the Associated Press up to midnight indicates the probable election of McKinley and Helms, although returns are so meager from a number of doubtful states that the election can only be reached by an estimate based upon the gains and losses.

The best estimates obtainable indicate that McKinley and Helms have given a majority of 20,000 votes. McKinley has about 20,000 votes, Helms about 10,000 votes, and the remainder of the states are still in doubt.

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
