# STRUCK WITH A BOULDER Harry Roberts Inflicts a Severe Injury on Nicholas Semittroth.

Nicholas Schmittroth, a miner who lives near the mouth of Little Cottonwood canyon, was struck on the head with a rock by an angry neighbor Sunday afternoon. Harry Roberts, a man who used to drive a hack in this city, was the man who inflicted the blow, which was the result of an altercation which access the result of an altercation which arose between the two men, be cause Roberts objected strenuously to the other man walking through premises. Schmittroth in company with his son, started out for the hills Sunday afternoon, and as a shorter route they started through Robert's fields, when the later overtook them, very abusive language was exchanged, when suddeniy according to Schmittroth's son, Roberts picked up a boulder and hurled it at his father. The missile struck him in the back of the head with such force that for a few moments he was unconscious. When he recovered his son helped him home, a conveyance was secured and they drove into the city to

secured and they drove into the city to consult a physician. They went to the home of a friend on West Fifth South street, where for a time it seemed that Schmittroth was improving, but in the night he lapsed into unconsciousness. Dr. Kerr was summoned and after examining him de-ceded that he had sustained a concussion of the brain. Later in the night the injured man was removed to the

the injured man was removed to the Holy Cross hospital. Schmittroth's son, Henry, yesterday, went before Justice McMaster and swore to a complaint charging Roberts with assault with a deadly weapon. Deputies Goldman and McDuff, served the warrant and later in the afternoon Robert's was arraigned. He pleaded not guilty and was sent to the county jail in default of a \$250 bond. Although Roberts admits having struck Schmitt-roth, he says that he did it with his bare knucklas. Schmittrath is in Schmittroth h proving very rapidly at the Sospital.

### Says That the Town There Does Not Need Quarantining.

Dr. Beatty, secretary of the health board, has received the following report from Koosharem, Utah:

"Since my last report there has been several cases which are in three of the same families as before, five in one which are all of the same family. The Peterson residences which Dr. Garrison visited have all had the disease, but are now over it. The flag will be removed on March 26th. All cases are under strict quarantine. We believe we have it under control at present.

"Our postoffice does not need to be closed for it is well guarded; nor does our town need to be quarantined." Continuing the Koosharem health officer calls attention to an article in the Doesn't Nurs written from the the Deservet News written from the town of Greenwich. He says "all that there is of that town is the postoffice, as the rest of the place is called Box Creek. where the lots contain 160 acres each.' He says also that the John West, referred to in the article, lives seven miles south of Koosharem. He then proceeds to say that 'if the 'News' desires to publish letters from lunatics the health board will keep it supplied."

He would have been 68 years old had he lived until tomorrow, and as fate has he nyed diffit officiency, and as fate has ordained it, the anniversary of his birthday will become his burial day, as his funeral will be held in Nephi to-morrow at 2 p. m. His bedy was em-balmed and shipped home by Under-taker Joseph W. Taylor. Judge Foote was born in the State of New York. His parents Joined the "Mormon" Church while he was quite young, and he passed through the soul.

young, and he passed through the soul-harrowing scenes of Nauvoo, coming to Utah in 1848. He settled first in this city but subsequently moved to Nephi, city but subsequently moved to Nephi, where he engaged in the cattle and mercantile business, making a success of both, due to his keen business in-sight and his frugality. He served Junb county as probate judge, county attorney and county selectman, and was superintendent of the co-operative store for tweive years.

He was re-spected for his sterling integrity, and although he was firm be had sympathy which gave his firmness a softened as-pect. He was a substantial citizen, a redit to his State and an ornament to the community in which he lived, and his loss will be felt throughout the State.
