Articles of incorporation were filed with Clerk Farrell today, of the Logan Power company, a corporation formed under the laws of Colorado, and whose principal place of business is in the city of Ouray, Colorado, William Story, George D. Wilson and Oliver Dean are the incorporators, and the capitalization of the company is placed at \$250, 000, divided into 25,000 shares of the par value of \$10 each. The life of the corporation is fixed at twenty years.
