In the judgeship contest yesterday before Judge Morse, in the counting of ballots, more irregularities were dis-closed in the conduct of the election in Morgan county. It was shown that one of the judges of election was himself a candidate for justice of the peace, and that he personally say to the that he personally saw to the writing of his own name under the Republican column of nearly every ballot supplied column of nearly every ballot supplied to voters for use in his district. He personally wrote his name on 117 and C. E. Condie, a Republican checker of another district, wrote 94. This particular district was Morgan No. 4 and the candidate was Morgan H. Welch. This circumstance, coming out after the first recount, injected a new element into the case, from the fact that part of the balcase, from the fact that part of the bal-lots were written by a candidate. The

lots were written by a candidate. The district was gone over again and the ballots reclass ded. Mr. Welch and Mr. Condie each t. tifled and also Richard Frye, one of the election judges.

It also developed, according to the testimony of Fred W. White, candidate for justice of the peace of Canyon Creek district, who had acted as judge of election and had written his own name on the ballot in the Republican column before, supplying them to the voters, had also written the name of Samuel Florence, Republican candidate Samuel Florence, Republican candidate for constable, Orson M. Porter, Re-publican checker, had also assisted in the writing, and testified to the fact. Also that the ballots were given to the

There were many objections raised by the attorneys for the contestant in the light of this evidence. They objected on the ground that the ballots contained identifying marks, that the candidate for office had acted as judge of election, and that parties other than the judges had been allowed to handle them, and that the ballot was not secret.

The sixteen packages of ballots from Davis county were identified by the Davis county clerk, Henry Stable, and also by his deputy. The envelopes were all found in good shape and the two officers testified that they only had had access to the vault where they were kept. A start was made on counting the Davis county ballots, but it soon developed that the contestants' attorneys, Judges Powers and C. C. Richards, were challenging practically all the Howell ballenging practically all the Howell ballots, and their action flually extended into a general challenge on the ground that the ballots were not according to law, in that they contained a printed motto just above the Socialist column. This motto was, "Workers of the World, Unite." After some argument Judge Morse announced that he would pass on this objection this morning.

During the day several witnesses were also examined relative to the Weber county ballots, the witnesses being per-




