The testimony went to show that Thurston was driving a horse through Ogden canyon July 2, when the horse refused to go any further. Thurston became angry and beat the horse. Some ladies and gentlemen reported his cruelty to the animal to Officer Seabright, who placed him under arrest. The young man pleaded innocence and claimed he did not beat the horse severely. To the great surprise of the officers the jury tried him brought in a verdict of not guilty.

IDAHO.

Weekly Crop Bulletin and Weather Report.

U. S. Department of Agriculture, Idaho Section, Climate and Crop Service, Weather Bureau. Weekly crop bulletin, for the week ending Monday, July 11, 1904.

The temperature averaged about normal throughout the state during the week, having been slightly above normal in western districts and slightly below in eastern sections; frequent local rains occurred, varying greatly in amounts in different localities, but generally sufficient to be of benefit to vegetation. Taken as a whole, the week was perhaps the most favorable one of the season. Nearly all streams and canals continue to carry an abundance of water for irrigation.

CROPS.

Fruit—All fruit crops made rapid advance during the week; markets are well supplied with the later berries, and considerable quantities of early peaches have been offered. Strawberries and cherries are maturing in the more elevated portions of the state.

Grain—Fall grain is being harvested in the warmer portions of the state, and barley, oats and spring wheat are approaching maturity; ripening of fall grain and heading of spring grain is extending to eastern sections; unirrigated grain, especially in eastern counties, has been greatly benefited by recent rains; some heavy grain was lodged by the rain, but this applies to but small areas.

Vegetables—Potatoes, sugar beets and garden vegetables which escaped injury from the June frosts are in excellent condition, while those damaged by frost are making rapid recovery, and in many instances promise good returns, though maturity will be later than usual; the improvement in sugar beets has been especially noticeable.

Stocks—Both range and domestic stock continue to find an abundance of good water, and are consequently in excellent condition.
