THE STRIKE.

The Engineers and Firemen Not

Responsible for the Trouble.

CHICAGO, Feb. 28.—The officials of

the Burlington road state that applica-

tions for positions as engineers and

firemen are coming in constantly from

all over the country, but as the com-

pany does not accept anybody except

after a rigid examination, the process

of hiring men is slow, and consequent-

ly they do not expect to be in a posi-

tion of hiring men for days. About

men have so far been selected. For

mail notice was issued this afternoon

to the striking engineers and firemen

unless they report for duty by 9 o'clock

tomorrow they will be considered out

of the company's employ.

This evening rumors

of a compromise

began to fly about. It was said that

representatives of neighboring roads,

leading a strike system, had been

asked to call on the Burlington to

negotiate for the release of the men.

Chief Arthur and Grand Mas-

ter Sargent said no offer would be

made from them. They were willing to

compromise, and added that the pro-

position of the board had not been

discussed, as General Manager

Stone refused to concede anything on

the third proposition—free and un-

limited work on the Burlington, and

there the negotiations stopped.

They declared the engineers and

firemen had been made by the men on

minor details of this demand. Chief

Arthur said that a strike would be

declared if the company refused to

promise or arbitration had reached

him, but he had assurance from

Stone that the company would main-

tain "neutrality."

"Suppose they pool with the Bur-

lington, and passenger or freight

traffic?

Any pooling arrangement would

be a violation of the "neutrality" rule

and would be a serious blow to the

company, he said.

Large squads of policemen are

stationed at the Union Depot, and a

detail is sent over the river to Har-

lem, for the protection of new engi-

neers. Governor Morton has called

this evening to Captain Jeff Danlop,

instructing him to hold his company in

readiness.
