Receipts and Expenditures.

Washington, March 1.-The monthly comparative statement of the government receipts and expenditures shows that for the month of February, 1904. the total receipts were \$45,895,496 and the expenditures \$42,651,772, leaving a surplus for the month of \$3,240,634. For February, 1903, the surplus was \$5,250,000

The receipts from the several sources of revenue are given as follows: Cutoms, \$20,794,649; decrease, \$1,600,000. Internal revenue, \$18,067,921; increase, \$2,000,000.

Miscellaneous, \$7,032,835; .Increase. \$2,150,060. The expenditures on account of the

war department show an increase of \$1,000,000: on account of the navy de-partment an increase of \$1,900,000. For the eight months of the present fiscal year the receipts exceeded the expenditures by \$4,882,000.

Employers to Combine.

New York, March 2 .- Preliminary steps have been taken for the forma tion of all the employers' associations in New York. The purpose is to bring them into closer association in dealing with the labor unions so that the handling of all transactions between the em-ployers and the wageearners may be greatly simplified.

It was rumored among union men that the meeting was the first step in the direction of the amalgamation of al the employers' associations in New York, but this was emphatically denied by leading employers. The secretaries in the new organiza-
