McGill of the New York Bonanza at Park City was down from the mine yesterday with some fine looking samples of highly min-eralized limestone found in the drift off the 1,000 foot level. The drift is in about 85 feet. It is expected that the vein which is being sought should be found about 110 feet from the shaft As the drift is now making five feet a day some startling developments should be made in the next week or 10 days. 10 days.

Two powerful searchlights have been installed at the pit of the Nevada Con-solidated Copper company at Mineral Flat, Nevada. One of the lights is of 5,000 candle power and the other is of 10,000. The company has also installed an electric device that will thaw out 500 feet of pipe in 20 minutes.

The stock of the South Utah Mines and Smelters, which is a reorganization of the Newhouse Mines and Smelters, has been listed on the New York curb. It is said that the company will start up with \$300,000 in the treasury and no debts.

According to W. A. Ray, who has just returned from the Rye Patch Con-solidated mining property in Humbol/4, there is from eight to 15 feet more of work to be done in the lower tunnel at the property before the vein will be reached under the old Borland stope.

E. W. Huise & Co., of Ely have secur-ed a membership on the local stock ex-change. The company secured the seat of T. R. Kelly. The company has opened up offices in the Shubert thea-ter building.
