Judge Underwood Confident Woman Suffrage is Constitutional.

WASHINGTON, 24. - Judge Underwood, U. S. district judge for Virginia, has written a letter, in which he says he feels very confident that the fourteenth and lifteenth amendments to the U. S. Constitution, together with the enforcement act of May 31, 1871, have secured the right to vote to female citizens of Virginia as fully as are now exercised and enjoyed by male citizens.
