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## EVIDENCE IN HARRY MOSS CASE

Prosecuting Witnesses All Heard — Pathetic Scene in Court.

## B.H.ROBERTS LECTURES TONIGHT

Shocking Death of Baby — Young David Carr Injured by Jumping on Raging Wagon.

Ogden, Utah, April 26.—The state completed its evidence last evening in its case against Harry Moss, charged with manslaughter, that of killing William E. Stone on the night of June 10, 1904.

Walter Wilson and Roy How testified to the tragedy, detailing the fight in which Moss, it is alleged, stabbed Stone, inflicting such injuries that he died as a result of the same the next morning at 3 o'clock. Their testimony was the same practically as that of Robert L. Taylor.

## SITES FOR EXPERIMENT FARM

Commission Visits Several Utah County Points—Serious Runaway.

Provo, Utah, April 26.—The commission to locate the experiment station spent a pleasant day in Provo yesterday, visiting available sites. They were accompanied by the county commissioners, the experiment station committee of the Commercial Club, Senator Snoot and President Holbrook. In the afternoon the party returned for luncheon at the Hotel Roberts. In the afternoon the party visited the Springville road, the Kamas and Rawlins farms on the Rock Canyon road and the Thompson and Crainer farms on the Provo canyon road were visited.

After dinner at the Hotel Roberts, a reception was given in honor of the visitors at the Commercial club rooms, attended by many prominent citizens. An entirely impromptu program of speeches, songs and music was rendered.

The members of the commission present were Prof. J. A. Widtsoe, director of the Agricultural college extension station, J. W. McAllister of the Agricultural college, and Wm. Spry and W. D. Canfield of the state board of land commissioners.

Today the commission visited properties sites at Payson, American Fork and Lehi.

TEACHERS ASSIGNED.

The finance committee of the board of education last evening presented a list of demands necessary to maintain the city schools for the ensuing year, placing it at \$34,500. Of this amount \$15,500 will be raised from state and county taxes and from school lands sale and rent, leaving \$19,600 to be raised by local taxation. This is a greater amount, however, than the \$5,000 mill tax authorized for maintenance will bring and it may be necessary to limit the school year of 1905-06.
