

ATHLETES WILL MEET TOMORROW

Contests on Field and Track of Utah A. A. U. at Wandamere.

Large Crowd Expected to be on Hand—Sunshine Will Put Track in Good Condition for Sprints.

The first athletic meet of the Utah division of the A. A. U., scheduled to take place Saturday afternoon, was postponed until tomorrow afternoon on account of the rain. The meet will be held at Wandamere, and it is expected that the popular resort will be crowded with people anxious to see Utah's best athletes perform.

It was at first decided to hold the meet Saturday in spite of the rain and a number of interested persons went down to Wandamere to see it, but it was finally decided to postpone the events until Tuesday and give the sun a chance to put the track and field in condition for the contests. At a meeting of the games committee of the A. A. U. held at some time yesterday it was decided to postpone the meet until Tuesday. The first event will be the 100 yard dash, and the program will be run off as rapidly as possible.

CRUSHED UNDER CAR.

Albert Flandro, Aged 10 Years, Loses His Leg Under Wheels.

Albert Flandro was run down by a Murry car, near Eleventh South and State street, Saturday afternoon, and for an hour the lad, who is 10 years of age, was pinned down by the weight of the car, until the arrival of the wrecking crew. The boy was conscious all the time, and displayed remarkable bravery and fortitude, making no outcry whatever. When the car was finally lifted, it was seen that Albert's leg was badly crushed, and he was taken at once to the L. D. S. hospital. The attending surgeon is of the opinion that the member will be saved, though the boy was very restless last night. His condition today is reported to be somewhat improved. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Albert Flandro, live on Capitol avenue, near where the accident took place.

ACCUSED MEN ARRAIGNED.

Three Alleged Crooks Plead Not Guilty In Daynes Burglary Affair.

Ed Phillips, Fred McFarland and Ed Jennings, who were brought back from Denver by Capt. Burdette and charged with complicity in the Daynes jewelry robbery, were arraigned in Judge Diehl's court this morning and entered a plea of not guilty to the accusation of receiving stolen property. The case was set for hearing Monday, June 11.

WILL SUE CITY.

E. E. Rich to Bring Action Following City Creek Floods.

Ex-Councilman E. E. Rich will sue the city for heavy damages on account of the injury to his new North Temple street property by flooding from City Creek, which flows in front of his residence. Mr. Rich has suffered from several feet of water in his cellar, and such a soaking to his premises generally that raising produce of any kind there or in the vicinity is impossible. The entire block is reported as being swampy. Mr. Rich is not thinking of suing the "American" party, but is inclined to sue the city. The basement of the emergency plant of the Utah Light & Railway company was flooded yesterday, on account of the rise in the Jordan river, and the water entered the plant in order to keep the water out of the fly-wheel pit.

GLEN LUMBER CO. SELLS OUT.

A Half Million Dollar Deal Consummated in This City Saturday.

The Glen Lumber company, a Utah corporation, owning 10,000 acres of timber land in Glen and Mendocino counties, Cal., on Saturday sold out all its property to the Goodyear Lumber company of Wisconsin, one of the millionaire lumber institutions of the country. The consideration was \$500,000 of which \$175,000 was paid down in cash and the remainder in notes. The deal is understood to have been a profitable one to the local concern, of which George Romney is president, W. W. Rifer, vice president, and E. A. Smith, secretary and treasurer. The board of directors comprises L. S. Hille, C. W. Sibbey, C. E. Burton, F. S. Murphy and H. C. Wilkey. A meeting of the board of directors was held this morning and 50 percent of the capital was ordered returned in cash to the stockholders forthwith. Mr. F. S. Murphy, lumber broker, conducted the negotiations.

JORDAN BOOMING BANK HIGH TODAY

River is Higher Than it Has Been For Years—Sloughs Filling Up.

Another large rainstorm may back the Jordan floodwater up into the western portion of the city. The old river is running along now right up to the banks, and higher than it has been for years. North of Sixth North street there is a considerable flooded area, while all streams entering the river are being backed up. West of the Jordan all the sloughs are filling much larger than normal areas, while Beck's lake is becoming of enormous size. The Bear, the Provo, the Weber, and all other main sources of water supply are sending a great volume of water into Great Salt Lake, as none is needed for irrigation on account of the recent rains. This may result in unprecedented high water in the lake, as the present level is much higher than normal for this time of year, and the river supply is not yet showing signs of abating. In other words, nearly all of this water has been diverted at this season into irrigating canals.

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RESIGNATION OF O. J. SALISBURY

Retires From State Board of Equalization—Governor Appoints Son in His Place.

Gov. Cutler today received the resignation of O. J. Salisbury of the state board of equalization and appointed Mr. Salisbury's son, E. W. Salisbury, to fill the vacancy. The reason for Mr. Salisbury's resignation was because of his ill health. The governor in accepting the resignation expressed his regret that it was necessary for Mr. Salisbury to resign and expressed the wish that he would soon be restored to his usual health. The resignation is as follows:

Salt Lake City, Utah. Gov. John C. Cutler. Dear Sir:—I herewith tender my resignation as a member of the state board of equalization. In view of the fact that my health is considerably impaired which will require my absence from the state for some time to come, and prevent my taking active part on the board that the interests of the state and the benefit of the taxpayers will be best served by my resignation. I feel it my duty to take this action, but I cannot refrain from expressing my regret in this withdrawing from your official family, nor let the opportunity pass without tendering to you my appreciation of the many courtesies you have extended to me, the support you have given the board and its policies, and to say furthermore that it has not been for the almost affectionate treatment and consideration which my associates on the board have given me, and which I appreciate very highly. I could not have retained my position thereon as long as this. With expressions of my high esteem, and good wishes for you personally and for the welfare of our state, I am, Very truly yours, O. J. A BAD SALOONKEEPER.

Short Changes a Soldier and Employs Revolver Into a Crowd.

Parker, Colo., June 10.—Facing an attempt to burn the saloon of L. E. Lambert, which probably would result in the destruction of the entire town, Parker, under guard night and day. A squad of soldiers from Fort Logan is patrolling the main street and outskirts of the town. People are in a state of terror. Lambert short changed a soldier Friday night, and when the soldier later protested, emptied his revolver into a crowd of 20, injuring two so badly that their lives were despaired of for time. He escaped after the shooting and friends of the wounded men have vowed they will get vengeance by burning the building. Yesterday an ineffectual attempt was made to fire the place. This alarmed the people of the town and as a result of their request for protection troops were dispatched from Fort Logan. Lambert is feeling nervous against Parker. He has not been apprehended, although the sheriff's deputies have trailed him to Denver.

RUSSIAN CONDITIONS WORSE.

London, June 10.—A St. Petersburg dispatch to the Telegraph says that the internal condition of Russia is growing more serious. Murder is common, pillage and looting are rampant, and the peasantry is in a state of rebellion. The statistics show that during the week ending Saturday, 183 persons suffered. Eighty were killed and 73 wounded. In some of the provinces organized bands of terrorists are holding up travelers and many acts of incendiarism are reported.
